BILL SUMMARY

- Allows a registered wholesale distributor of dangerous drugs to sell oxygen that will be used for the purpose of emergency care at the scene of an emergency to an individual who holds a valid certificated issued by a nationally recognized S.C.U.B.A. diving certifying organization.

CONTENT AND OPERATION

The sale of dangerous drugs

(R.C. 4729.51)

Under current law, with limited exception, no person other than a registered wholesale distributor of dangerous drugs is allowed to possess for sale, to sell, distribute, or deliver, at wholesale, dangerous drugs. Persons who are registered wholesale distributors of dangerous drugs are not allowed to possess for sale, or to sell, at wholesale, dangerous drugs to any person other than the following:

- (1) A licensed health professional authorized to prescribe drugs;
- (2) A licensed optometrist who holds a topical ocular pharmaceutical agents certificate;
- (3) A registered wholesale distributor of dangerous drug;
- (4) A manufacturer of dangerous drugs;
- (5) A licensed terminal distributor of dangerous drugs;
- (6) Carriers or warehousemen for the purpose of carriage or storage;
- (7) Terminal or wholesale distributors of dangerous drugs who are not engaged in the sale of dangerous drugs within this state;

(8) An individual who holds a current license, certificate, or registration issued by the state and has been certified to conduct diabetes education by a national certifying body specified in rules adopted by the State Board of Pharmacy, but only with respect to insulin that will be used for the purpose of diabetes education and only if diabetes education is within the individual's scope of practice under statutes and rules regulating the individual's profession.

The bill adds that a registered wholesale distributor of dangerous drugs may sell oxygen to an individual who holds a valid certificate issued by a nationally recognized self contained underwater breathing apparatus (commonly known as "S.C.U.B.A.") diving certifying organization, but only with respect to oxygen that will be used for the purpose of emergency care or treatment at the scene or an emergency. S.C.U.B.A. diving certifying organizations are private entities that certify divers who meet their specified qualifications. For example, the Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI) is a widely recognized certifying organization in the United States.
