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**BILL SUMMARY**

- Requires the State Board of Education, by December 31, 2007, to adopt academic standards for physical education for grades K through 12.
- Directs the State Board to adopt model curricula for physical education for grades K through 12.
- Eliminates the requirement that physical education standards and model curricula are subject to approval by concurrent resolution by both houses of the General Assembly.

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**CONTENT AND OPERATION**

**Background**

In accordance with current law, the State Board of Education has adopted statewide academic standards for each of grades K through 12 in the core subjects of reading, writing, math, science, and social studies. These standards describe the academic content and skills that students are expected to learn and display at each grade level. Within 18 months after completing standards for a core subject, the State Board must also adopt a model curriculum for that subject.<sup>1</sup> Current law

further directs the State Board to adopt academic standards and model curricula in computer literacy for grades 3 through 12 and in both fine arts and foreign languages for grades K through 12.<sup>2</sup> School districts may use any of the model curricula as an instructional tool, but they are not required to do so.

Although not mandatory under current law, the State Board is permitted to adopt academic standards or a model curriculum for health or physical education. However, if the State Board intends to adopt health or physical education standards or model curricula (or revise existing ones), the standards or curricula must receive legislative approval through passage of a concurrent resolution. The law specifies that neither chamber of the General Assembly may vote on a concurrent resolution approving health or physical education standards or curricula until its education committee holds at least one public hearing on the matter.<sup>3</sup>

**Physical education standards and curricula**

(R.C. 3301.0718)

The bill adds physical education to the subject areas in which the development of academic standards and model curricula is mandatory. Specifically, by December 31, 2007, the State Board must adopt standards in physical education for grades K through 12.<sup>4</sup> Within 18 months after the adoption of the standards, the State Board must adopt model curricula for instruction in physical education for those grades. Physical education standards and curricula cannot be combined with those for health.

The bill eliminates the requirement in current law that the State Board cannot formally adopt or revise standards or model curricula for physical education unless the General Assembly approves them by concurrent resolution following at least one public hearing in each chamber. Consequently, physical education standards and model curricula would become effective upon adoption

by the State Board. Health standards and model curricula, however, remain subject to legislative approval as in current law.
