BILL SUMMARY

- Names parts of 11 state highways and one bridge.
- Authorizes the issuance of a "Choose Life" license plate bearing an identifying marking designed by Choose Life, Inc., and approved by the Registrar of Motor Vehicles.
- Requires the Registrar to collect a contribution in the amount of \$20 plus a \$10 processing fee for each application for registration and registration renewal that involves "Choose Life" license plates.
- Requires the contributions collected from persons who are issued the license plates to be deposited into the "Choose Life" Fund, which the bill creates, and paid by the Director of Health to certain eligible private, nonprofit organizations.
- Establishes procedures for the Public Utilities Commission to designate exempt railroad crossings where certain buses and other specified vehicles may cross without making the stop otherwise required of those vehicles.

CONTENT AND OPERATION

Naming of highways and a bridge

The bill names the following highways and bridge:

"Choose Life" license plates

Under the bill, the owner or lessee of any passenger car, noncommercial motor vehicle, motor home, or other vehicle of a class approved by the Registrar of Motor Vehicles may apply to the Registrar for the registration of the vehicle and issuance of "Choose Life" license plates. The application for "Choose Life" license plates may be combined with a request for a special reserved license plate provided in current law. Upon receipt of the completed application and compliance with the requirements of the bill, the Registrar is required to issue to the applicant the appropriate vehicle registration and a set of "Choose Life" license plates with a validation sticker, or a validation sticker alone when required by current law.

In addition to the letters and numbers ordinarily inscribed on license plates, "Choose Life" license plates must be inscribed with the words "Choose Life" and a marking designed by Choose Life, Inc., a private, nonprofit Florida corporation.



The Registrar must review the design and must approve it if it is feasible. If the design is not feasible, the Registrar must notify Choose Life, Inc. of this fact and the organization may resubmit designs until a feasible design is approved. The license plates must bear county identification stickers that identify the county of registration by name or number. (Sec. 4503.81(A).)

"Choose Life" license plates and a validation sticker are issued upon receipt of a contribution of \$20 as provided in the bill (see below); payment of the regular license tax prescribed in current law, any applicable local motor vehicle tax, any applicable special reserved license plate fee, and a fee of \$10 for the purpose of compensating the Bureau of Motor Vehicles for additional services required in the issuing of "Choose Life" license plates; and compliance with all other applicable laws relating to the registration of motor vehicles. (Sec. 4503.81(B) and (C).)

For each application for registration and registration renewal that the Registrar receives under the bill, the Registrar is required to collect a contribution of \$20 and transmit it to the Treasurer of State for deposit in the "Choose Life" Fund, which the bill creates (see below). The Registrar also is required to deposit into the existing state Bureau of Motor Vehicles Fund the additional \$10 fee that the applicant pays for the purpose of compensating the Bureau. (Sec. 4503.81(C).)

"Choose Life" Fund

The bill creates in the state treasury the "Choose Life" Fund, consisting of the contributions that are paid to the Registrar by applicants who elect to obtain "Choose Life" license plates and of money from the Fund that was distributed by the Director of Health to an eligible organization but was returned by the organization because it was not expended (see below). All investment earnings of the Fund must be credited to the Fund. (Sec. 3701.65.)

Under the bill, the Director of Health at least annually must distribute the money in the Fund to any private, nonprofit organization that is eligible to receive funds under the bill and that applies for funding. The Director must distribute the funds based on the county in which the organization applying for funding is located and in proportion to the number of "Choose Life" license plates issued during the preceding year to vehicles registered in that county. Within each county, eligible organizations that apply for funding must share equally in the funds available for distribution to organizations located within that county.

The Director is required to develop an application form for funds and may determine the funding schedule and procedures. The application must inform the applicant of the conditions for receiving and using such funds. The application must require evidence that the organization meets all of the following requirements:

- (1) It is a private, nonprofit organization;
- (2) It is committed to counseling pregnant women about the option of adoption;
- (3) It provides services within the state to pregnant women who are planning to place their children for adoption, including counseling and meeting the material needs of the women;
- (4) It does not charge women for any services received;
- (5) It is not involved or associated with any abortion activities, including counseling for or referrals to abortion clinics, providing medical abortion-related procedures, or pro-abortion advertising;
- (6) It does not discriminate in its provision of any services on the basis of race, religion, color, marital status, national origin, handicap, gender, or age.

The Director is prohibited from distributing funds to an organization that does not provide verifiable evidence of meeting the above requirements and may not provide additional funds to any organization that fails to comply with provisions of the bill regarding its previous receipt of funds.

An organization that receives funds is required to do all of the following:

- (1) Use not more than 60% of the funds for the material needs of pregnant women who are planning to place their children for adoption or for infants awaiting placement with adoptive parents, including clothing, housing, medical care, food, utilities, and transportation;
- (2) Use not more than 40% of the funds for counseling, training, or advertising;
- (3) Not use any of those funds for administrative expenses, legal expenses, or capital expenditures;
- (4) Annually return to the Choose Life Fund any unused money that exceeds 10% of the money distributed to the organization.

The organization must submit to the Director an annual audited financial statement verifying its compliance with these funding requirements.

Stopping of certain vehicles at highway grade crossings

Under current law, the operator of (1) any bus, (2) any vehicle used for the transportation of pupils to and from a school or school-related function if the



vehicle is owned or operated by, or operated under contract with, a public or nonpublic school, and (3) any vehicle transporting a material that federal law requires to display an identifying placard, before crossing any highway grade crossing, must take certain actions. The operator must stop the vehicle and listen through an open door or open window and look in both directions along the track for any approaching train or for signals indicating an approaching train. If there is no approaching train, only then may the operator proceed, exercising due care. This requirement does not apply at any highway grade crossing located within a municipal corporation or to abandoned tracks, spur tracks, side tracks, and industrial tracks when the Public Utilities Commission has authorized and approved the crossing of the tracks without making the required stop.

The bill provides that this stopping requirement does not apply at any highway rail grade crossing that the Commission authorizes and approves as an "exempt crossing" (sec. 4511.63(B)).

Any local authority may file an application with the Commission requesting the approval of an exempt crossing. Upon receipt of such a request, the Commission must authorize a limited period of time for the filing of comments by any party regarding the application. The Commission must notify each railroad operating over the crossing of the comment period by registered mail, and then must conduct a public hearing in the community that is seeking the exempt crossing designation, after providing appropriate prior public notice of the comment period and the public hearing. (Sec. 4511.63(B)(1).)

After considering any comments or other information received, the Commission may approve or reject the application. The Commission may establish conditions for the exempt crossing designation by order, including requiring the placement of a traffic signal at the crossing. A designation becomes effective only when appropriate signs giving notice of the exempt designation are erected at the crossing as ordered by the Commission and any other conditions the Commission orders are satisfied. (Sec. 4511.63(B)(2).)

The Commission may issue an order rescinding an exempt crossing designation if it finds that a condition at the exempt crossing has changed to such an extent that the continuation of the designation compromises public safety. It may conduct a public hearing to investigate and determine whether to rescind the exempt crossing designation, and if it so acts, it must order the removal of any exempt crossing signs and may issue any other necessary order. (Sec. 4511.63(B)(3).)
