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Executive Summary

This report contains financial information on boards, commissions, and agencies that regulate occupations and professions, as defined in Ohio Revised Code section 4743.01. Individual boards provided information for this report.

Most of the Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Boards listed in this report deposit funds into the Occupational and Professional Licensing Fund, also known as Fund 4K9. The Office of Budget and Management reports that Fund 4K9 has a positive balance and should operate with a surplus through FY 2005.

Other boards discussed in this report are funded through appropriations that are derived from various sources such as fines.

Eleven enacted bills in FY 2003 impacted 13 of the licensing boards in one or more ways. Am. Sub. H.B. 95, the biennial operating budget bill, had the broadest impact on boards by increasing license fees for six of the boards. The following enacted bills are discussed in Section I.

The majority of the licensing boards experienced no change in staffing levels. Fourteen of the 37 licensing boards discussed in this annual report experienced either increases or decreases in staff or board members. The reported staff or board member increases or decreases were minimal in nearly every case.

Of the 222 specific license types included in this report, 113 or 46.7% of the license types decreased in quantity from FY 2002 to FY 2003.

Executive Summary

There were no large increases in the number of active licenses in any of the licensing boards and no major changes to the organization of the licensing boards during FY 2003. Generally, the number of active licenses increased minimally for most boards.

Four boards or commissions licensed a total of over 100,000 of their respective license types in FY 2003. They are the Ohio Board of Nursing (199,229), Division of Securities in the Department of Commerce (135,496), Board of Emergency Medical Services (130,408), and the Board of Cosmetology (107,998). Licenses issued by the Board of Emergency Medical Services carry no fees, therefore, they generate no revenue. The Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Division is funded solely from traffic fine revenue in the seat belt fund.

Revenue and expenditure patterns over the period vary with the renewal cycle of licenses issued. Board-by-board figures reveal no distinct pattern that is applicable to all boards.

The administrative operations of the licensing boards are centrally supported by the Department of Administrative Services' (DAS) Central Services Agency (CSA). Nearly 70% of the boards included in this report use various services and forms of assistance available to them through DAS. The following services and forms of assistance are listed in descending order of frequency used: payroll, budget/fiscal assistance, vouchers, photocopying/printing, personnel issues, bookkeeping, purchasing, data input to CAS, warrants, general consultation and source of information, and fixed asset management system (FAMS) data entry and report verification. The consolidation of services available to the boards through CSA provides administration efficiencies for these shared services.

Introduction

Ohio's Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Boards

Ohio's various occupational and licensing boards monitor, license, and regulate selected occupations and professions. Many of the regulated professions provide services in technical and specialized fields such as nursing, medicine, and engineering, in which the failure to meet minimum standards could be dangerous or costly. The boards are charged to help ensure the health, safety, and welfare of the public by ensuring the professionals who practice in these fields meet certain standards.

To fulfill the requirements of section 103.13 of the Ohio Revised Code, the Legislative Service Commission prepares this report annually to evaluate the extent to which these state boards and commissions are financially self-supporting. This report provides a summary of the financial activities and some of the legislative changes that took place during FY 2003 (July 1, 2002 through June 30, 2003). The information in this report is divided into three main sections that are described below.

Section I: General Information – The first section begins with a description of the functions of each licensing or regulatory board, followed by a brief description of any legislation that became effective in FY 2003 that affects any of the boards. This section also contains a table of general information, such as staffing levels and renewal cycles for each board.

Section II: Active Licenses – The second section lists the total number of active licenses for each board for this fiscal year and the previous fiscal year. The change in the total number of licenses from the last fiscal year to this fiscal year is also calculated.

Section III: Revenues and Expenditures – The third section contains information on the revenues and expenditures for each board for FYs 2002 and 2003. This information is organized according to the renewal cycle for each board. Many of the boards renew licenses biennially and therefore, receive the bulk of their fee revenues in alternate years. The table contains revenue and expenditure information on Fund 4K9 and on other funds used by the boards. The table also shows the changes in both revenues and expenditures from FY 2002 to FY 2003 and the net gain or loss for the two fiscal years combined.

Finally, the appendix lists the name of each board's chief administrator, the board's postal address, phone number, and email address.

General Information: Board Descriptions

Accountancy Board of Ohio

The Accountancy Board of Ohio tests, licenses, and regulates individuals and firms who practice public accounting in this state to ensure that the services being provided are performed in accordance with all appropriate ethical and professional standards.

Ambulance Licensing Board, Ohio

The Ohio Ambulance Licensing Board identifies, inspects, and licenses all private and hospital-based ambulances and Mobile Intensive Care Units in the state of Ohio.

Architects and Landscape Architects, State Boards of Examiners of

The State Board of Examiners of Architects and the State Board of Examiners Landscape Architects are two separate boards that share one budget and the same staff. These boards regulate the practice of architecture and landscape architecture through education, training, examination, and practice standards.

Athletic Commission, Ohio

The Ohio Athletic Commission regulates boxing, wrestling, kick boxing, karate, and tough person contests within the state of Ohio. The Commission licenses athletic agents and promoters of boxing, wrestling, and kick boxing.

Barber Board, Ohio State

The Ohio State Barber Board licenses barbers, barber shops, and barber schools. The Board protects the health and welfare of the consuming public by setting standards for licensure and by enforcing these standards through exams, investigations, and disciplinary actions.

Building Standards, Board of

The Board of Building Standards certifies local building departments to enforce the Ohio Building Code. The Board also promulgates the state building code, boiler code, elevator code, and pressure piping systems code. A minor function of the Board is to certify building department personnel and fire protection system designers.

Chiropractic Board, Ohio State

The Ohio State Chiropractic Board protects the health and welfare of Ohio's citizens through licensure, enforcing these licensure standards through examination, renewal, clinical inspection, investigation, and disciplinary action.

Construction Industry Examination Board, Ohio

The Ohio Construction Industry Examination Board licenses contractors in five trades: electrical, plumbing, hydronics, refrigeration, and heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) to assure professionalism and customer confidence through testing and continuing education. Between FY 2001 and FY 2002, the requirement was placed on these occupations to hold licenses instead of certificates.

Cosmetology, State Board of

The State Board of Cosmetology maintains sanitary and professional standards through the licensure and regulation of the profession of cosmetology and the indoor tanning industry.

Counselor, Social Worker, and Marriage and Family Therapy Board

The Counselor, Social Worker, and Marriage and Family Therapy Board regulates the professions of counseling, social work, and marriage and family therapy by establishing licensure and practice standards for the professions.

Dental Board, Ohio State

The Ohio State Dental Board licenses and regulates the practice of dentistry, dental hygiene, and dental assistant radiography in Ohio.

Dietetics, Ohio Board of

The Ohio Board of Dietetics protects the health and safety of Ohio citizens by regulating the practice of dietetics as defined in the Revised Code.

Embalmers and Funeral Directors, Board of

The Board of Embalmers and Funeral Directors licenses and regulates embalmers, funeral directors, funeral homes, crematories, and embalming facilities. The Board also resolves complaints against any of those who are regulated.

Emergency Medical Services, Board of

The Board of Emergency Medical Services oversees training and certifies all emergency medical technicians and firefighters. The Board approves all training institutions and instructors, as well as administers its grant fund.

Engineers and Surveyors, State Board of Registration for Professional

The State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Surveyors oversees the licensure and renewals of professional engineers and professional surveyors, and enforces the laws relating to these professions.

Financial Institutions, Division of

The Division of Financial Institutions acts as the primary regulatory authority over state-chartered banks, savings banks, savings & loans, and credit unions. The Division licenses and regulates check cashers, check casher lenders, consumer finance companies, credit service organizations, mortgage brokers, mortgage loan officers, pawnbrokers, precious metals dealers, small loan companies, insurance premium finance companies, and money transmitters.

Hearing Aid Dealers and Fitters Licensing Board

The Hearing Aid Dealers and Fitters Licensing Board licenses all hearing aid dealers pursuant to the requirements of the Revised Code.

Industrial Compliance, Division of

The Division of Industrial Compliance provides building and construction plans, review and inspections of plumbing, electrical and structural systems, elevators, boilers, bedding and upholstered products as well as regulation of individuals in the building trades. The Division provides administrative support for three boards: Board of Building Standards (which develops Ohio Building Code), Board of Building Appeals (which handles compliance adjudication), and the Ohio Construction Industry Examination Board (which provides testing, certification, licensing, and continuing education services for skilled trades). The Division administers the licensing of boiler operators and steam engineers and also provides support to the Ohio Ski Tramway Board and the Historical Boilers Licensing Board.

Medical Board of Ohio, State

The State Medical Board of Ohio is charged to protect and enhance the health and safety of Ohio's citizens by regulating the practice of Doctors of Medicine, Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine, Doctors of Podiatric Medicine, Limited Practitioners, Physician Assistants, Anesthesiologist Assistants, and Acupuncturists.

Motor Vehicle Collision Repair Registration, Ohio Board of

The Ohio Board of Motor Vehicle Collision Repair Registration registers all independent collision repair facilities.

Motor Vehicle Dealer Licensing Board

The Motor Vehicle Dealer Licensing Board carries out all of the due process functions necessary to identify violators, charge them with the violations, and to effectuate the suspension and revocation of the licenses of such violators.

Motor Vehicle Salvage Dealer Licensing Board

The Motor Vehicle Salvage Dealer Licensing Board carries out all of the due process functions necessary to identify violators, charge them with the violations, and to effectuate the suspension and revocation of the licenses of such violators.

Nursing, Ohio Board of

The Ohio Board of Nursing serves as a safeguard for the health, welfare, and safety of the public and protects the public against unqualified practitioners of nursing. The Board regulates the professions of nursing and dialysis care.

Nursing Home Administrators, Board of Examiners of

The Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators uses its statutory powers to develop, adopt, impose, and enforce regulations prescribing standards that must be met by individuals to receive a license as a nursing home administrator.

Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Athletic Trainers Board

The Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Athletic Trainers Board regulates and licenses the occupational therapists, physical therapists, and athletic trainers by licensing qualified candidates, investigating complaints, and reviewing the continuing educational activities of licensees.

Optical Dispensers Board, Ohio

The Ohio Optical Dispensers Board regulates the practice of opticianry and ophthalmology through examination, continuing education, and license enforcement.

Optometry, Ohio State Board of

The Ohio State Board of Optometry carries out the responsibilities listed in the Revised Code relating to examinations, licensing, continuing education, compliance, investigation, and enforcement activities for all Ohio optometrists.

Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics, State Board of

The State Board of Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics statutorily administers and enforces the regulation of orthotics, prosthetics, and pedorthics by licensing practitioners and promulgating appropriate regulatory language.

Pharmacy, Ohio State Board of

The Ohio State Board of Pharmacy licenses all persons who distribute dangerous drugs and sites where dangerous drugs are stored in Ohio. The Board also enforces the Pharmacy Practice Act, Dangerous Drugs Distribution Act, Food and Drug Act, Controlled Substance Act, and the Criminal Code of Ohio relating to drugs.

Psychology, State Board of

The State Board of Psychology licenses psychologists and school psychologists for practice administered outside of school settings. The Board also regulates the practice of psychology and takes enforcement action against unethical or illegal practices. In addition, the Board registers unlicensed service providers who work under the professional supervision of a licensee.

Real Estate and Professional Licensing, Division of

The Division of Real Estate and Professional Licensing administers the law governing real estate brokers, sales individuals, foreign real estate dealers, appraisers, cemeteries, private investigators, and security guard providers.

Respiratory Care Board, Ohio

The Ohio Respiratory Care Board regulates and licenses the practice of respiratory care by examining and licensing qualified applicants, investigating misconduct and complaints, establishing educational standards, and mandating continuing education.

Sanitarian Registration, State Board of

The State Board of Sanitarian Registration is charged to protect the public health by ensuring that individuals who engage in the practice of environmental health possess and maintain specialized knowledge and skills that pertain to the field of environmental health science.

Securities, Division of

The mission of the Division of Securities is to maintain a balance between investor protection and capital foundation enhancement. To achieve this mission, the Division regulates the sale of securities and licenses securities professionals who sell securities and give advice about investing in securities in Ohio. The Division also promotes its investor education program.

Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology, State Board of

The State Board of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology regulates the professions of speech-language pathology and audiology in accordance with the Revised Code.

Veterinary Medical Licensing Board, Ohio

The Ohio Veterinary Medical Licensing Board licenses, enforces, and regulates the practice of veterinary medicine in the state of Ohio.

General Information: New Legislation Enacted in FY 2003

Eleven bills enacted during FY 2003 affected 13 boards and commissions. Summaries of this legislation are presented alphabetically by the board name. All the bills discussed below were effective between July 1, 2002 and June 30, 2003. The revenue amounts are the additional revenue estimated to be gained by the fee increases provided in H.B. 95. In addition, H.B. 95 (the main operating budget bill) and H.B. 87 (the transportation budget bill) made appropriations to these boards for the FY 2004 and FY 2005 biennium.

Athletic Commission, Ohio

Am. Sub. H.B. 95 made changes to section 3773.33, moving the Ohio Athletic Commission office to Warrensville Heights, Ohio. Under section 3773.43, the Ohio Athletic Commission raised its price of licenses for judges, managers, referees, seconds, boxers, timekeepers, and trainers as shown in the following table.

Cosmetology, State Board of

House Bill 415

H.B. 415 made numerous revisions to the composition of the State Board of Cosmetology and to the provisions governing licensees and individuals associated with various aspects of the Board's authority and operations. Provisions in H.B. 415 that affect the State Board of Cosmetology are shown in the following list.

- Addition of two new members to the Board
- Creation of requirements for the rental of booth space
- Creation of requirements for the acquisition of an independent contractor license
- Identification of penalties for misdemeanor violations
- Increases in educational requirements associated with a practicing or managing license
- Increases in certain license fees
- Prohibition of use of certain products containing certain ingredients
- Allowance for imposing of certain fines or increases in fines
- Creates changes relevant to authority associated with issuance and handling of work permits and inactive licenses
- Grants permission regarding the employment of persons to teach under the Cosmetology Law
- Changes the final day of the biennial licensing period to January 31 of each odd-numbered year
- Addresses the licensing and administration of cosmetology services delivered within a state correctional institution for females
- Revises certain definitions relevant to the practice of cosmetology
- Makes requirements regarding the legal consumer age to use tanning facilities without parental consent

Emergency Medical Services, Ohio Board of

Senate Bill 115

S.B. 115 makes several changes related to firefighters. Among the provisions, it provides up to 40 hours of paid leave for state employees for service as a volunteer firefighter or EMT and increases the benefits to survivors of volunteer firefighters. The bill was signed into law on December 18, 2002.

Senate Bill 124

S.B. 124 specifies the procedures that a hospital must follow in applying to the American College of Surgeons for verification or reverification as a trauma center. It provides that a hospital may operate as a trauma center under provisional status in certain circumstances and for a specific time period. It also requires a hospital to provide prompt written notice of its status as a trauma center or provisional trauma center to the Director of Health, Emergency Medical Services Division, or the Department of Public Safety, and the physicians and physician advisory boards serving the emergency medical services region. The bill was signed into law on November 3, 2002.

Senate Bill 223

S.B. 223 provides payment through the workers' compensation system for the emergency diagnostic testing of peace officers, firefighters, and emergency workers when they come into contact with the blood or body fluid of another person, including mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. This bill was signed into law on December 13, 2002.

Senate Bill 258

S.B. 258 permits background checks to be performed with respect to persons under consideration for appointment or employment as a full-time paid or volunteer firefighter or EMT. It also prohibits the appointment or employment of a firefighter or EMT if the person has been convicted of or pled guilty to a felony, arson, or substantially equivalent offense. In addition, the bill provides further protection for firefighters and EMTs by exempting their residential and familial information from Ohio's Public Records Laws. The bill was signed into law on January 8, 2003.

Am. Sub. H.B. 95 increased the following fees for licenses administered by the Board of Embalmers and Funeral Directors in section 4717.07.

Engineers and Surveyors, State Board for Registration of Professional

H.B. 337 makes extensive changes to the engineers and surveyors licensing law. The bill was effective August 7, 2002.

Hearing Aid Dealers and Fitters Licensing Board

Am. Sub. H.B. 95 increases the fees for a hearing aid dealers and fitters license, trainee permit, and duplicate license or permit. Fee increases are provided in sections 4747.05, 4747.06, and 4747.10.

Medical Board of Ohio, State

Am. Sub. H.B. 474, which was effective March 23, 2003, created the Compassionate Care Task Force to study compassionate care/end of life issues/pain management issues. A physician representing the Medical Board is included on the task force. The bill amended sections 4730.25 and 4731.22 to include an independent ground for discipline: assisting in a suicide.

Nursing, Ohio Board of

Am. Sub. H.B. 474, which was effective March 23, 2003, created the Compassionate Care Task force to study compassionate care/end of life issues/pain management issues. The bill amended sections 4730.25 and 4731.22 to include an independent ground for discipline: assisting in a suicide.

S.B. 91 made various changes affecting the delegation of MR/DD personnel. The changes govern the performance of medication administration, health-related activities, and tube feedings by unlicensed MR/DD personnel to individuals with mental retardation and developmental disabilities. Instead of requiring the Board of Nursing to adopt rules governing these delegated activities, the Department of MR/DD will write rules governing these activities, and the Board will rescind Ohio Revised Code sections 4723.21 and 4723.22.

Am. Sub. H.B. 95, the biennial operating budget bill for FY 2004 – FY 2005, contains provisions that affect the Ohio Board of Nursing. Some provisions went into effect immediately upon the Governor's signing of the bill, while other provisions were effective September 26, 2003. The bill increases fees charged by the Ohio Board of Nursing, including allowing the Board to charge up to \$15 for a board-sponsored continuing education activity related to the laws and rules governing the practice of nursing in Ohio. The budget bill also contains a provision requiring the Board to operate a nurse education grant program. To fund this program, \$10 from all license renewal fees will be used for the next ten years. Two other changes in the bill include allowing

practical nursing education programs to incorporate training in IV therapy as part of the program's curriculum and requiring the Ohio Board of Nursing to certify community health workers. Initial certificates for community health workers must be issued no later than February 1, 2005 and rules governing this program will be drafted during FY 2004. The following table displays the fee increases in the Ohio Board of Nursing's fee structure as shown in section 4723.08.

Pharmacy, State Board of

Am. Sub. H.B. 221, which will be effective April 7, 2003, requires the State Board of Pharmacy to establish a drug repository program for the donation, collection, and redistribution of unadulterated prescription drugs that are in their original sealed and tamper-evident unit dose packaging. The Board, in consultation with the Director of Health, is required to adopt rules that establish:

- Eligibility requirements for participants, donors, and drugs.
- Requirements for donor and recipient forms.
- A handling fee to cover the restocking and dispensing of eligible drugs.

The Board will incur a one-time cost associated with the implementation of the drug repository program, including adopting rules, and informing entities and individuals of the program requirements. Also, the Board will incur ongoing costs from the routine monitoring of drug repository programs. The routine monitoring is necessary to ensure that the programs are in compliance with all requirements.

Real Estate and Professional Licensing Board (Department of Commerce)

H.B. 188, which was effective March 24, 2003, contained language to clarify that peace officers are exempt from registration requirements when working for either a private investigator or security guard company. Peace officers were also exempted from licensure requirements when performing security work as an independent contractor. Additionally, the bill modified the civil penalties from “not less” than \$100 per calendar day of violation.

Section III

Revenues and Expenditures

Revenues and Expenditures

Information in this section is divided based on each agency's renewal cycle. The boards included in this report renew licenses on a triennial, biennial, or annual basis.

Agencies with a Triennial Renewal Cycle

Division of Emergency Medical Services

The Division of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) is the administrative arm of the Emergency Medical Services Board under the Department of Public Safety. The eight license types that the Division of Emergency Medical Services oversees carry no license fees and therefore, generate no revenue. The EMS Division is funded solely from traffic fine revenue in the seat belt fund, 83M. The Ohio Department of Public Safety requests a budget (based upon past expenses), which is approved; and the Ohio Legislature sets an appropriated budget for the Division. Money is awarded through the transportation budget to the Division of Emergency Medical Services only in the amount of the Division's operating expenses. The Division of Emergency Medical Services carries forward no fiscal balance or deficit from fiscal year to fiscal year. The expenses accrued by the Division of Emergency Medical Services for FY 2003 totaled \$2,053,526.

Accountancy Board of Ohio

The Accountancy Board of Ohio operates from two state funds, the 4K9 and the 4J8 funds. The Board's license revenues and the Board's operational expenditures are included in the 4K9 Fund. Moneys from the 4J8 Fund come from fees paid by licensees and are used for the Board's scholarship program. The 4J8 Fund was created as a result of FY 1993 legislation that increased the basic education requirements an individual must meet to become licensed as a Certified Public Accountant.

The Accountancy Board of Ohio has been running surpluses in the 4K9 Fund since the inception of the 4K9. The Accountancy Board's last general fee increase was in 1983. To comply with a scholarship law in 1993, the Accountancy Board raised individual license fees.

In 1999, pursuant to the recommendation of the Office of Budget and Management, the Accountancy Board reduced firm registration fees more than 80%. The reduction in registration fees and an increase in the educational requirements for the CPA certificate, causing a decline in the number of certificates issued, resulted in declining board revenues that has extended through FY 2002-2003.

Agencies with a Biennial Renewal Cycle

Fourteen of the boards renew their licenses on a biennial cycle. Because of this, each board receives the bulk of its licensing revenue every other year. A board may run a deficit in its “off” year that will be eliminated during its renewal year. The two-year renewal cycle must be analyzed to determine if a board is financially self-sufficient. Data on the following page contains information on the boards with a biennial renewal cycle.

Agencies with an Annual Renewal Cycle

Twenty-one of the boards in this report renew their licenses on an annual basis. These boards are, therefore, less likely to experience “on” and “off” years. Nine of the boards that renew licenses on an annual basis have all or partial funding from the 4K9 Fund, while 12 of these boards or commissions are funded through various other funds. Data on these boards and commissions is found in the spreadsheet following the entries for agencies with a biennial renewal cycle.
