



## *Detailed Fiscal Analysis*

This bill will allow the Division of Wildlife to sell gift certificates for hunting permits, fishing permits, fur taker permits, special deer or turkey permits, or wetlands habitat stamps. The cost for the gift certificate will be the same cost as the permit. The cost for each permit is summarized in the table below.

The actual number of hunting, trapping and fishing licenses may increase slightly as a result of the opportunity to purchase gift certificates. People who would not have purchased a license otherwise may receive the certificate as a gift. Persons who receive a hunting or trapping gift certificate and are first-time license buyers are still responsible for taking hunter education courses.
