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## ***Detailed Fiscal Analysis***

The bill includes alpacas, by inclusion in definitions, in the laws governing financial assistance for livestock exhibitions at the state fairgrounds, livestock exhibitions, concentrated animal feeding facilities, licensure of livestock dealers, and registration of livestock brands. According to the Ohio Alpaca Breeders Association, there are approximately 370 alpaca farms in Ohio and approximately 8,000 alpacas.

### ***Financial assistance for livestock exhibitions***

Current law provides that the Director of Agriculture may give financial assistance to a statewide, multi-state, or national nonprofit livestock association to defray not more than 50% of the rental costs of the Ohio Expositions Center for purposes of conducting a livestock species exhibition at the Center. According to the Exposition Center web site, rental rates for livestock are \$12 per head, per show for cattle, and \$10 per head, per show for goats, sheep, and swine. The exact fiscal effect of this provision is unknown. Presumably the inclusion of alpacas would result in more livestock species seeking to have rental costs defrayed. Therefore, the inclusion of alpacas may not result in additional costs to the Department of Agriculture, but may result in some livestock associations receiving less money to defray rental costs.

### ***Concentrated animal feeding facilities***

The Department of Agriculture requires all operators of concentrated animal feeding facilities first be issued a permit to install, then a permit to operate a facility. Inclusion of alpacas in the definition of "agricultural animal" with respect to feeding facilities could potentially result in a greater number of permits issued for installation and operation of a concentrated animal feeding facility. As such, the Department of Agriculture could experience greater administrative costs for the processing of these permits. However, these costs can be offset by any revenues generated by fees associated with the issuance of an operating permit.

### ***Licensure of dealers and registration of livestock brands***

The bill includes alpacas in the definition of "animals" or "livestock" for the purposes of livestock dealers and broker fees. Livestock dealers and brokers are required to apply for a license with the Department of Agriculture. The fees for these licenses are \$10, \$25, or \$50, depending on the headage of animals being sold. It is unknown as to how many additional dealers or brokers would be licensed as a result of the bill. Individuals dealing solely with alpacas would be required to apply for a new license.

Alpacas are also included in the definition of "livestock" for the purposes of registering a livestock brand. Any registration fees are determined by the Director of Agriculture, and are used to defray the costs of maintaining a central registry of livestock brands. Registration of a brand is good for five years. The inclusion of alpacas in this definition could potentially result in an increase in brand fee revenues, as well as an increase in administrative costs for the registration of the brand.

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
