Note: The state fiscal year is July 1 through June 30. For example, FY 2010 is July 1, 2009 – June 30, 2010.

- The bill requires the Department of Health to include information on its web site to promote complex regional pain syndrome education. Additionally, the Department must notify boards of health, hospitals, and other health care providers about the availability of the information. There may be a minimal increase in administrative costs related to these activities.

Local Fiscal Highlights

- No direct fiscal effect on political subdivisions.

Detailed Fiscal Analysis

The bill requires the Department of Health to add content to its web site to promote complex regional pain syndrome (CRPS) education. The content is to include CPRS causes, risk factors, and treatment options. Additionally, the bill requires the Department to notify health care providers about the availability of the information on the web site. The Department may realize administrative costs related to collecting and posting the required information as well as notifying health care providers. This cost is not likely to exceed minimal as long as the Department can notify health care providers through existing channels of communication. The threshold for a minimal cost determination is \$100,000 per year. Any ongoing additional cost of maintaining the information on the web site is likely negligible.

The bill also adopts multiple state symbols and designates various special days, weeks, and months. Please consult the LSC bill analysis for further details on these provisions, none of which have fiscal effects on the state or local governments.

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
