Contents: Revises the procedures and penalties governing the towing of motor vehicles under certain circumstances

State Fiscal Highlights

- The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) will likely incur additional expenditures to administer the provisions of the bill, the magnitude of which is unknown.
- Any monetary fines collected pursuant to the towing regulations established by the bill are required to be deposited to the credit of the Public Utilities Transportation Safety Fund (Fund 5LT0).
- Members of the Motor Vehicle Towing Advisory Council, established by the bill, are entitled to reimbursement for reasonable and necessary expenses for their work on the Council. The bill does not specify a payment source for such expenses.

Local Fiscal Highlights

- There could be a potential increase in expenses for the Franklin County Court of Common Pleas, due to a provision that the court is to enforce arbitration decisions made by PUCO. It is unlikely that this increase would exceed minimal.

Detailed Fiscal Analysis

The bill makes several changes to motor vehicle towing requirements and procedures under certain circumstances. Many of these changes primarily affect private towing companies and do not have any fiscal impact on governmental entities. However, the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO) will likely incur additional expenditures to administer the provisions of the bill.

The bill requires PUCO to facilitate mediation between a person whose vehicle has been towed and the towing service if the person disputes some aspect of the removal. If mediation does not produce a conclusion satisfactory to the person whose motor vehicle was towed or if the towing service refused to participate in the mediation, the person may request arbitration from PUCO. The results of arbitration are subject to enforcement by the Franklin County Court of Common Pleas. The mediation and arbitration duties with which PUCO is charged are different from existing PUCO duties, and could result in a significant increase in expenditures. Such expenditures may be paid for by an increase in revenue to the Public Utilities Transportation Safety Fund (Fund 5LT0; see below).

The bill also requires PUCO to adopt rules pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Law governing for-hire motor carriers engaged in towing motor vehicles. Any costs related to this provision could likely be absorbed within PUCO's existing budget.

The bill creates a nine-member Motor Vehicle Towing Advisory Council, which must provide advice and recommendations to PUCO regarding any rule PUCO may adopt that relates to the towing of motor vehicles. The bill specifies that members of the Council serve without compensation but that they must receive their reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the conduct of council business. The bill does not specify a payment source for such expenses.

The bill requires PUCO to establish a schedule of sanctions to be imposed on a for-hire motor carrier engaged in the towing of motor vehicles. The sanctions "may include a monetary fine."¹ The bill further requires that "any monetary fines collected" pursuant to these towing regulations must be deposited in Fund 5LT0, and the forfeitures can be utilized by PUCO only to administer tow truck regulations.

Existing law, unchanged by the bill, requires that forfeitures collected by PUCO be deposited to the credit of Fund 5LT0 until the amounts credited equal the total amount appropriated from the fund for the fiscal year. Once this point of parity is

reached, any additional forfeitures or fines received during the fiscal year are required² to be credited to the GRF.

Synopsis of Fiscal Effect Changes

- The substitute bill adds duties for PUCO that will increase agency expenditures. These duties include most notably PUCO's role as a mediation facilitator and as an arbiter of towing disputes.
- The substitute bill creates the Motor Vehicle Towing Advisory Council, and the members of the Council must be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary expenses.
- Any monetary fines collected from towing services can be utilized by PUCO only to administer tow truck regulations.
- The duty of the Franklin County Court of Common Pleas to enforce arbitration decisions made by PUCO is new in the substitute bill.
