Note: The estimated General Revenue Fund (GRF) spending for FY 2003 used in this LSC Redbook reflects the 2.5% reduction made as a result of the Governor's January 22, 2003 budget cut order. The executive reduction was applied across-the-board to FY 2003 GRF appropriations, subject to certain exceptions. Subsequent to such reductions (and not reflected in the Redbook), state agencies were permitted to reallocate the amount that each of their GRF appropriation line items was reduced, while still absorbing the 2.5% budget cut within the total amount of their GRF appropriations.

OVERVIEW

The Ohio Athletic Commission was created by Am. Sub. SB 240 of the 121st General Assembly. The purpose of the Commission, which replaced the State Boxing Commission, is to regulate boxing, wrestling, kickboxing, karate, and tough man contests in the state in an effort to protect the safety of the participants and the interests of the public. The agency carries out its mission by setting standards for licensure of individuals, granting permits, and conducting events sanctioned by the Commission.

During the FY 1998-1999 biennium, the Commission was moved from the General Revenue Fund to the Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Fund (Fund 4K9). Revenues from licensing fees generated by the 22 occupational licensing boards are deposited into this fund and any revenues in excess of expenditures are held in this fund for future use by the Commission. The goal is for each board in the 4K9 Fund to be financially self-sufficient. In FY 2002, the Ohio Athletic Commission had a deficit of \$49,186 in the 4K9 Fund.

According to figures provided by the Commission, approximately 700 licenses were issued in FY 2002. The Commission renews its licenses annually. Revenues and expenditures for FY 2002 were \$95,157 and \$144,343 respectively. Thus, the Commission had a deficit of \$49,186.

In March 2001, the Athletic Commission began implementing the provisions of H.B. 107 of the 123rd General Assembly. This act required the Commission to license and regulate athlete agents. The act created the Athlete Agents Registration Fund in which athlete agent registration and renewal fees are deposited. The Governor's recommended budget eliminates this fund and places athlete agents within the Occupational Licensing Board Fund. The Commission has currently registered under 50 athlete agents. The Legislative Service Commission estimates that there are between 170 to 210 athlete agents operating in Ohio.

The Governor's recommended budget also increases fees for various licenses associated with boxing and professional wrestling. The estimated increase in annual revenue from these fee increases would be \$14,720.

ANALYSIS OF EXECUTIVE PROPOSAL

Ohio Athletic Commission

Purpose: Regulates boxing, wrestling, kickboxing, karate, and tough man contests in the state.

The following table shows the line items that are used to fund this program series, as well as the Governor's recommended funding levels.

Ohio Athletic Commission

Program Description: In accordance with Chapter 3773. of the Revised Code, the Ohio Athletic Commission regulates prizefights, boxing, professional wrestling, and athlete agents within the state in an effort to protect the safety of the fight participants and the interests of the public.

Funding Source: Fund 4K9 (License fees)

Line Items: 175-609, Athletic Commission-Operating

Implication of the Executive Recommendation: The executive recommendation will allow this agency to maintain its current level of service. The Executive has recommended an appropriation of \$188,250 in FY 2004, an increase of 5.0% over FY 2003 estimated spending, and \$200,205 in FY 2005, a 6.4% increase over FY 2004.

PERMANENT AND TEMPORARY LAW

This section describes permanent and temporary law provisions contained in the executive budget that will affect the Commission’s activities and spending decisions during the next biennium.

Permanent Law

Increases Fees for Certain Licenses (R.C. section 3773.43)

The provision increases fees for various licenses issued by the Athletic Commission. It also allows the Athletic Commission to establish fees 50% higher than the fees required in statute, with the approval of the Controlling Board. Current law allows the Commission to establish fees 25% higher than the fees required in statute, with the approval of the Controlling Board. The chart below shows the fees increased by this provision and the expected generated revenue, based on the number of such licenses issued last year. All revenues are deposited in the Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Fund (Fund 4K9).

Eliminates Athlete Agents Registration Fund (R.C. 4743.05 and 4711.22)

This provision eliminates Fund 5R1, the Athlete Agents Registration Fund and redirects all money received from the Athlete Agents law to the Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Fund (Fund 4K9). The net cash available in Fund 5R1, as of June 30, 2002, was \$1,770.

Eliminates Requirement that Athletic Commission Maintain an Office in Youngstown (R.C. section 3773.33)

Current law requires the Athletic Commission to maintain an office in Youngstown and to keep all of its permanent records there. This provision eliminates that requirement. The Athletic Commission indicates that it would move its office to Cleveland if this provision becomes law.

Temporary Law

Transfer of Cash Balance From Fund 5R1

This provision requires the Director of Budget and Management to transfer the cash balance in the Athlete Agents Registration Fund (Fund 5R1), to the Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Fund (Fund 4K9).

REQUESTS NOT FUNDED

The Athletic Commission made one formal supplemental request that is funded in the Governor's recommended budget. The request was to provide a full-time office assistant and for continuation funding.

The Athletic Commission also proposed a 5% event tax on professional wrestling in order to fund Commission operations. This request is not included in the Governor's recommended budget.
