Board of Nursing

- The Board received no funding for FY 2007 and will be absorbed into the Department of Health that year
- The Board licenses approximately 190,000 individuals

OVERVIEW

The Board of Nursing is part of the 4K9 Fund group. The 4K9 Fund (Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Fund) is a General Services Fund that is a repository for license fees and other assessments collected by the state's professional and occupational licensing boards. The 4K9 Fund was established by Am. Sub. H.B. 152 of the 120th General Assembly. Prior to the creation of the fund, appropriations for each licensing board were made from the GRF. This created some problems as some boards contributed more revenues than they expended and others had to be subsidized by the GRF since the revenues generated did not meet their expenditures. The 4K9 Fund eliminated these problems. The philosophy of the fund is that each board must generate enough revenues to cover their expenses. It is also quite common for the boards to develop a surplus in the fund to cover unforeseen economic hardships.

The mission of the Board of Nursing is to promote and protect the health of Ohioans through the safe and effective practice of nursing. Comprised of a 13-member board appointed by the Governor and a staff of 56 employees, the Board regulates more than 185,000 individuals in the field of nursing. The Board also certifies 1,500 dialysis technicians.

Chapter 4723. of the Revised Code provides statutory authority for the Board's activities and requires the Board to protect the public against unqualified R.N.s and L.P.N.s. Additionally, the Board provides oversight for nursing education programs and continuing nurse education requirements. The Board also facilitates the administration of the national licensure examination for R.N.s and L.P.N.s. Each year approximately 5,000 Ohioans apply to take this examination.

Increased Duties as a Result of the Criminal Background Check

In 2003, the Board began to implement the requirement to submit all applicants for licensure as a nurse in Ohio to a criminal background check (Am. Sub. H.B. 327 of the 124th General Assembly). This will be fully implemented in 2006. The Board states that this will enhance public safety, however, it has increased the Board's workload a great deal.

Increased Fees and Duties in FY 2004-2005 Biennium

The biennial license renewal fee was increased in FY 2004 from \$45 to \$65, a \$20 increase for the two-year license. This fee increase put the Board's biennial rate of \$65 equal to the national average for nurse licensure fees. Additionally, there was a \$25 increase in the examination and licensure endorsement fee, a \$5 increase in the paper license verification fee, and a \$10 increase in the duplicate license issuance fee as well. New fees were also implemented in the FY 2004-2005 biennium. These are as follows: \$25 for the issuance of an IV therapy card and \$2,000 for out-of-state survey visits to nursing education programs not in Ohio but that have clinics in-state. The Board is allowed to charge \$15 per participant per activity for continuing education credits. The revenue from the continuing education credits is deposited into the Nursing Special Issues Fund (Fund 5P8). These moneys are used for a Nursing Workforce Planning Center that addresses issues such as the supply and demand of nurses in Ohio.

Also new to the Board for the FY 2004-2005 biennium is the requirement to operate a nurse education grant program. The program involves granting schools and medical facilities funds to increase the number of nurses enrolled. To fund the program, \$10 of all license renewal fees will be used for the next ten years. The Board is also required to certify community health workers. Initial certificates must be issued no later than February 1, 2005.

CAVU Licensing System

The Board, in partnership with the Department of Administrative Services, has implemented a web-based multi-board CAVU licensing system. Each board will pay their share of the costs out of Fund 4K9. The Nursing Board estimates spending \$140,704 in FY 2006 and \$129,040 in FY 2007 for this system.

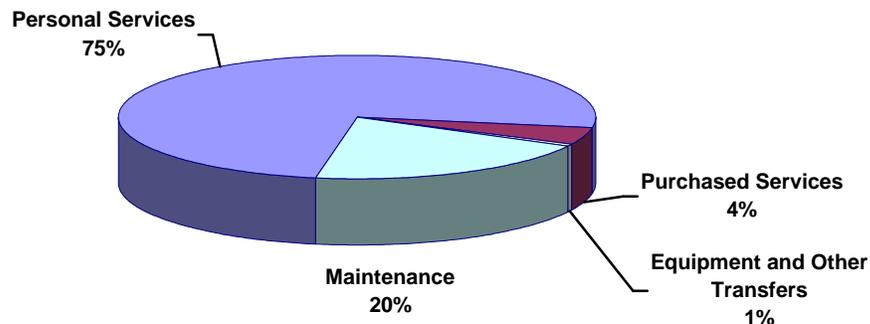
Governor's Recommendations

The Board requested \$5,446,591 in FY 2006 and \$5,446,991 in FY 2007. The Executive recommends funding of \$5,508,280 in FY 2006 and \$0 in FY 2007. Included in this amount is \$5,000 for FY 2006 and \$0 in FY 2007 for Nursing Special Issues (Fund 5P8). These moneys are used to support a Nursing Workforce Planning Center. The recommended funding is a 1.13% increase over FY 2005 estimated expenditures.

In FY 2007, the Executive recommends that the 27 independent occupational licensing boards be absorbed into the departments of Health, Commerce, and Public Safety. As such, the Executive recommended no funding in FY 2007 for the boards. In the case of the Nursing Board, the Board and its duties will be absorbed into the Department of Health. The specifics of this transfer will be addressed during FY 2006 by a task force consisting of the departments of Commerce, Health, Public Safety, and Administrative Services, the Office of Budget and Management (OBM), and the Governor's Office. According to OBM, current staff will be retained through FY 2006 and a hiring freeze and early retirement incentive will be offered to regulatory board staff. Effective July 1, 2006, all remaining regulatory board staff will be transferred to the relevant agency. Board members will be retained.

As shown from the chart below, the majority of funding for the Nursing Board goes to personal services. It is estimated that personal services will increase by 2.7% in FY 2006 compared to FY 2005 estimated levels.

Also H.B. 66, As Introduced, contains a requirement that the Board of Nursing create the Medication Aide Pilot Program. This program will allow medication aides to administer limited types of medications to residents of nursing homes and residential care facilities pursuant to delegation by nurses. This will increase costs to the Board. The amount is unknown at this time.

However, it is expected that some staff reductions will occur as a result of the implementation of a hiring freeze and early retirement incentive. Remaining staff for the Board will be transferred to the Department of Health in FY 2007. Board members will be retained.

Revenues and Expenditures

The Board licenses biennially with a majority of R.N. renewals occurring in odd-numbered fiscal years and L.P.N. renewals occurring in even-numbered fiscal years.

**Revenues do not include the \$5 of each renewal fee that is transferred to the Nurse Education Assistance Loan Program, which is a program that provides financial assistance to those enrolled in approved nursing programs. A total of \$205,710 in FY 2003 and \$687,375 in FY 2004 was transferred.

ANALYSIS OF EXECUTIVE PROPOSAL

Board of Nursing

Purpose: The Ohio Board of Nursing actively promotes and protects the health of the citizens of Ohio through the safe and effective practice of nursing as defined by law.

The following table shows the line items that are used to fund the Board of Nursing, as well as the Governor's recommended funding levels.

Program Description: The Board of Nursing governs the practice of nursing, as defined by Chapter 4723. of the Revised Code, by licensing nursing professionals in a variety of specialties, as well as certifying dialysis technicians.

Funding Source: General Services Fund Group (Funds 4K9 and 5P8). The activities of the Board are funded with licensure fees and other assessments collected by the state's professional and occupational licensing boards (4K9) and continuing education activity fees along with grants and gifts (5P8).

Line Items: 884-609, Operating Expenses and 884-601, Nursing Special Issues

Implication of Executive Recommendation: The Board requested \$5,441,591 in FY 2006 and \$5,503,280 in FY 2007. The Executive recommended funding of \$5,503,280 in FY 2006 and \$0 in FY 2007. The recommended funding for FY 2006 will maintain current service levels. The Executive recommended \$61,689 above what the Board requested. This will be used to help pay for the costs of the CAVU licensing system and for costs for increasing disciplinary actions. In FY 2007, the Board will be absorbed into the Department of Health. The specifics of this transfer will be addressed during FY 2006 by a task force consisting of the departments of Commerce, Health, Public Safety, and Administrative Services, the Office of Budget and Management, and the Governor's Office.

Temporary and Permanent Law Provisions: H.B. 66, As Introduced, includes a provision that consolidates the Board into the Department of Health beginning in FY 2007. The provision also includes the creation of a transition team to ensure the consolidation occurs smoothly and on schedule. The temporary language states that the necessary statutory changes and appropriations needed for the consolidation will be introduced in FY 2006.

Also in the As Introduced version of H.B. 66 is a requirement that the Board of Nursing create the Medication Aide Pilot Program. This program allows medication aides to administer limited types of medications to residents of nursing homes and residential care facilities pursuant to delegation by nurses. This will increase costs to the Board. The amount is unknown at this time.

In FY 2006, the Board received \$61,689 more than requested. The Board has stated that the difference will be used to help pay for CAVU licensing system costs and for expenses relating to the increase in disciplinary actions the Board reviews. In FY 2007, the Board requested funding of \$5,446,591. The Executive recommended funding of \$0. The Board will be absorbed into the Department of Health. Specifics of this transfer will be addressed by a task force made up of the departments of Commerce, Health, Public Safety, and Administrative Services, the Office of Budget and Management, and the Governor's Office.
