# Joint Legislative Ethics Committee

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- Monitors ethics compliance; investigates complaints; sanctions as appropriate
- Administers mandatory lobbyist registrations and filings
- Handles annual legislative financial disclosure statement filings

## OVERVIEW

The duties and responsibilities of the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee, which was created to serve the General Assembly, include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Establishing and enforcing a standard code of ethics.
- Receiving and hearing complaints alleging breaches of privilege, misconduct, or ethics violations.
- Obtaining information with respect to any complaint.
- Recommending appropriate sanctions.
- Acting as an advisory body on questions relating to ethics, conflicts of interest, and financial disclosure.
- Administering the annual financial disclosure forms of legislative officials and staff.
- Administering legislative, retirement system, and executive agency lobbyist registrations and filings.

This legislative agency consists of two components: (1) a 12-member legislative committee, and (2) the Office of the Legislative Inspector General, which employs an executive director and a staff of five for the purpose of assisting the legislative committee in exercising its powers and duties. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate appoint six of the legislative committee members each, and not more than three can be from the same political party.


## Executive Recommendation for FYs 2008 and 2009

Under existing law – division (B) of section 107.03 of the Revised Code – the executive branch of the state of Ohio has limited authority over the state's legislative branch, especially in the case of the biennial operating budgets and associated permanent and temporary law of legislative agencies. Although the biennial operating budgets of legislative agencies are presented to the legislature as executive recommendations, the Office of Budget and Management in reality only serves as the conduit through which legislative agency budgets are passed to the legislature.

That said, the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee requested for each fiscal year of the next biennium a zero-growth budget, with the expectation that it will be able to deliver the level of services currently being provided in FY 2007. As of this writing, the Committee's total FY 2007 expenditures are estimated at \$650,000. Its total requested funding level in each of FYs 2008 and 2009 is also \$650,000.


## Expense by Fund Group Summary

## ANALYSIS OF EXECUTIVE PROPOSAL

For budget purposes, as detailed below, the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee is considered a single program series agency and its activities are not subdivided into multiple programs.

### Single Program Series

### Legislative Inspector General

**Purpose:** To enable the Office of the Legislative Inspector General to assist the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee in exercising its powers and duties.

The following table shows the two line items that are used to fund the Legislative Inspector General, as well as the Governor's recommended funding levels.

### Legislative Inspector General

**Program Description:** The program supports the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee and the Office of the Legislative Inspector General in performing various duties and responsibilities, including, but not limited to: (1) establishing and enforcing a standard code of ethics to govern all members, employees, and candidates seeking election to the state legislature, (2) receiving and hearing complaints alleging breaches of privilege, misconduct, or ethics violations, (3) acting as an advisory body on questions relating to ethics, conflicts of interest, and financial disclosure, (4) administering the annual financial disclosure forms of legislative officials and staff, and (5) administering legislative, retirement system, and executive agency lobbyist registrations and filings.

**Funding Sources:** (1) GRF, and (2) initial, update, and late registration fees paid by lobbyists and their employers

**Line Items:** See above table

**Implication of Executive Recommendation:** At the recommended level of funding, the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee and the Office of the Inspector General will be able to carry out statutorily mandated duties and responsibilities and lobbying administration, including registration, reporting, and compliance.

### Temporary and Permanent Law Provisions

It does not appear that the executive-recommended budget contains any permanent or temporary law provisions directly affecting the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee or the Office of the Inspector General.

**Legal Basis:** Section 206.84 of Am. Sub. H.B. 66 of the 126th G.A. (originally established by Am. Sub. H.B. 492 of the 120th G.A.)

**Purpose:** Moneys appropriated to the line item pay for the personal services, purchased services, maintenance, and equipment costs of the Office of the Legislative Inspector General, a group of five full-time staff and an executive director, which assists the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee in performing statutorily mandated ethics-related duties and responsibilities and lobbying administration, including registration, reporting, and compliance.

**Legal Basis:** ORC 101.34(C) (originally established by Am. Sub. H.B. 492 of the 120th G.A.)

**Purpose:** Prior to the enactment of Am. Sub. H.B. 699 of the 126th General Assembly, moneys credited to the fund were required to be used solely for the operation of the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee and the Office of Legislative Inspector General and for the purchase of data storage and computerization facilities for legislative agent and executive agency lobbyist expenditure statements. The above noted act also permits the moneys to be used for the purchase of data storage and computerization facilities for retirement system lobbyist expenditure statements.
