Attorney General

OVERVIEW

Duties and Responsibilities

The Office of the Attorney General is involved in the state's justice and corrections system in a variety of ways including, but not limited to:

- Providing legal representation to and initiating litigation on behalf of statewide elected officials (including the Ohio General Assembly), all state departments, agencies, boards, and commissions.
- Issuing formal opinions on questions submitted by state officials and agencies, as well as county prosecutors.
- Initiating legal proceedings in areas related to environmental protection, consumer fraud, antitrust, Medicaid fraud, Workers' Compensation fraud, and patient abuse and neglect.
- Providing Ohio's 1,200-plus law enforcement agencies with training, investigative, technological, financial, prosecutorial, and other assistance available through such arms as the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy (POTA), the Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation (BCII), the Ohio Organized Crime Investigations Commission (OCIC), and the Capital Crimes Section.
- Administering the state's victim assistance efforts, most notably the Victims of Crime Compensation Program and the federal Victims Assistance Program.

FYs 2006-2007 Highlights

According to the Office of the Attorney General,¹ some of the agency's more notable accomplishments over the course of FYs 2006 and 2007 included:

- **Ohio Law Enforcement Gateway (OHLEG).** OHLEG is a secure Internet-based tool, first launched in late 2003, that provides law enforcement agencies and prosecutors with access to a host of databases and encourages sharing of information between jurisdictions. OHLEG now hosts an array of elements including the Ohio Local Law Enforcement Information Sharing Network (OLLEISN), which allows participating agencies to share their local reports online with other agencies throughout the state. OLLEISN was developed in partnership with the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police. Other components include OHLEG-SE,² OHLEG-RMS,³ LEADS,⁴ eSom,⁵ FinCrime,⁶ RxPATROL,⁷ eOPOTA,⁸ DNA Online, CCW database,⁹

MCCH,¹⁰ and the Identity Theft Passport. More than 10,000 law enforcement officials from nearly 1,000 agencies across Ohio are registered to use OHLEG, and investigators are conducting more than 3,500 searches per day using OHLEG's search engine.

- **Electronic Sex Offender Registration and Notification (eSORN).** The eSORN database provides one location where Ohioans can enter an address to see a map displaying information about sex offenders. It was developed with the assistance of Ohio's 88 county sheriffs. On average, nearly 9,000 people view the web site each day. Additionally, nearly 150,000 Ohioans have signed up to receive email notification when a registered sex offender moves, goes to work, or attends school within one mile of their home.
- **Prescription Drug Databases.** AGRx is an online tool that provides informative details on purchasing the most popular prescription drugs, including price comparisons from more than 300 stores. Another database, RxPATROL, provides information about prescription-drug crimes, to the OHLEG.
- **Charitable Organizations.** The Charitable Law Section implemented a web-based information management system that will integrate all functions of the section, including bingo licensing, complaint and investigation tracking, charity registration and reporting, and professional solicitor registration and reporting. When complete, the system will allow online filing of bingo license applications, online registration of charitable organizations, and filing of annual reports, and will allow public access to information on charities, including their financial reports, contracts with professional solicitors, and revenues generated from bingo operations. The program, being implemented in phases, is expected to be fully operational by the end of FY 2007.
- **Crime Victims.** The Crime Victims Services Section implemented procedures in order to speed the processing of Victims of Crime applications. The program was recently expanded to allow more victims of violent crime to receive compensation, including victims of hit and run accidents and families of police officers and fire fighters killed in the line of duty.
- **DNA Advances.** Ohio's convicted offender DNA database has more than doubled in size to nearly 150,000 profiles. This was due in part to the passage of a bill that requires anyone indicted of a felony or certain major misdemeanors to submit their DNA to the database.

Notable Legislative Enactments

Over the last few years, the General Assembly has enacted certain bills that have had the potential to notably affect the way the Office of the Attorney General does business. Of particular note in that regard, without describing in great detail the degree to which there has been, or will be, any noticeable ongoing fiscal effect, were the following bills.

- **Am. Sub. S.B. 185 (126th General Assembly).** The bill, effective September 21, 2006, made numerous changes in the Consumer Sales Practices Act, including providing the Attorney General investigative authority when a lender or broker in the purchase of a home has misled a consumer.
- **Sub. S.B. 262 (126th General Assembly).** The bill, effective July 11, 2006, permanently reinstates a law allowing certain inmates to apply for state-funded DNA analysis of evidence that could affirm their guilt or prove their innocence.
- **Sub. H.B. 104 (126th General Assembly).** The bill, effective February 17, 2006, requires both state agencies and business entities to notify individuals and consumers when they have experienced a breach of an individual's personal information, which would consist of an individual's name, accompanied by a social security number, a driver's license or state identification number, or an account, credit, or debit card number. The bill gives the Attorney General the ability to conduct an investigation and bring civil action against state agencies and businesses that fail to comply with the notification requirements in the statute.
- **Am. Sub. H.B. 53 (126th General Assembly).** The bill, effective May 17, 2006, requires stores and pharmacies to place all medicine containing pseudoephedrine as its sole active ingredient behind the counter. The Attorney General's BCII Narcotics Section responds to reports of methamphetamine laboratories throughout the state and provides training for local law enforcement officials.
- **Am. Sub. S.B. 281 (126th General Assembly).** The bill, effective April 5, 2007, will allow a person who suffers serious physical harm as a result of a hit and run accident to file a claim for an award of reparations from the Crime Victims Reparations Fund. It further states that a victim is eligible for reparations if this type of criminally injurious conduct occurred on or after July 1, 2000, and the application for an award of reparations must be filed within two years after the effective date of the act or as provided under continuing law, whichever is later.
- **Am. Sub. H.B. 461 (126th General Assembly).** The bill, effective April 4, 2007, mandates up to 24 hours a year of continuing professional training for peace officers and state highway patrol troopers and establishes the method by which the Attorney General reimburses the costs of training programs for peace officers and troopers of public appointing authorities.
- **Sub. H.B. 9 (126th General Assembly).** The bill, effective March 29, 2007, made several changes to the Public Records Law. The additional duties charged to the Attorney General are expected to require additional resources for materials, curriculum development, and Open Records educators.

EXECUTIVE RECOMMENDATIONS

Total Funding

The biennial budget request submitted by Attorney General Marc Dann, and recommended under the executive budget, totals \$403.5 million (\$201.0 million in FY 2008 and \$202.5 million in FY 2009), an amount that is \$46.6 million, or 13.1%, higher than the Office of the Attorney General's total combined expenditures for FYs 2006 and 2007. Of that proposed \$46.6 million increase in biennial expenditures, \$14.5 million, or 31.1%, will be appropriated from the GRF; the remainder, \$32.1 million, or 69.0%, of

the proposed increase will be drawn from various non-GRF funds. The increased GRF funding will be used to support the Attorney General's annual operating expenses, as well as for the statutorily mandated pay supplements for county sheriffs and county prosecutors.

Special Counsel Contracts

A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that on July 1, 2007, or as soon as practicable thereafter, the Attorney General shall undertake a review of the selection process for outside counsel for the state and shall review all options for recovering cost savings from respective state agencies to which counsel is provided, including potential options for charging state agencies for a portion of the savings realized. After undertaking such review, the Attorney General may develop, in consultation with the Director of Budget and Management, a cost savings method that accurately accounts for costs savings realized from the outside counsel selection process and may implement the method, subject to the approval of the Director of Budget and Management. If a method is implemented, the Attorney General shall report, not later than the thirtieth day of June in each of FYs 2008 and 2009, on its method and certify its continued accuracy to the Director of Budget and Management, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the Senate, and the Legislative Service Commission.

Notable Appropriation Line Item Activity

Tobacco Settlement Enforcement Funding Switch

Under current law, moneys are deposited to the credit of Fund U87, and appropriated to related line item 055-402, to be used by the Office of the Attorney General exclusively to pay costs incurred in the oversight, administration, and enforcement of certain provisions of the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement, such as limitations on advertising and marketing programs in Ohio related to the sale of tobacco products. Effective FY 2009, under the executive-recommended budget, the funding stream to cover these costs will be appropriated to newly created GRF line item 055-404, Tobacco Settlement Enforcement.

Employment Services Fund Elimination

Effective FY 2008, the cash balance and related expenditure activity of the Employment Services Fund (Fund 107) will be transferred to the General Reimbursement Fund (Fund 106). Upon completion of these transfers, the Employment Services Fund (Fund 107) will be abolished. Under current law, moneys deposited to the credit of Fund 107 are used to support operations of a portion of the Office of the Attorney General's Health and Human Services Section that handles unemployment compensation collection and litigation matters for the Department of Job and Family Services. Under the executive-recommended budget, this revenue stream and related purpose will be transferred to Fund 106.

Non-GRF Appropriation Increases

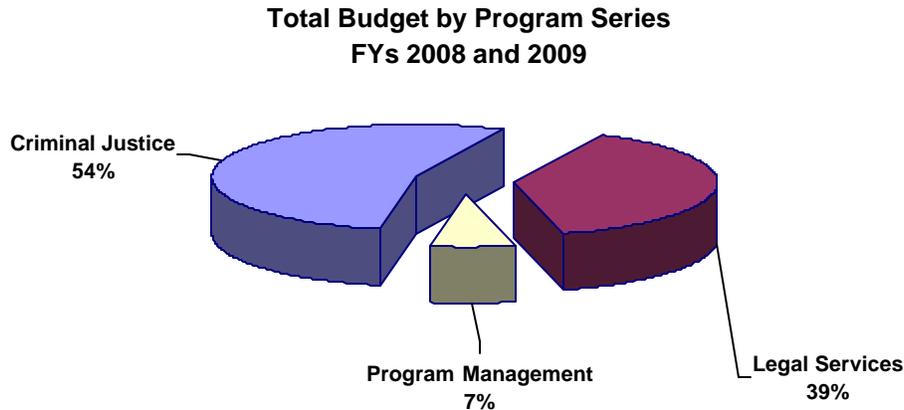
The Office of the Attorney General requested, and was granted under the executive-recommended budget, notable increases in the appropriation authority for several non-GRF funds and related line items. The reasons for the increases are detailed below, but, in general, appear to reflect a more realistic picture of recent cash flow activity (revenues and expenditures). Over the past several years, the Attorney General has come before the Controlling Board on many occasions to request increases in the appropriation authority of these and other non-GRF funds. As is the case with all non-GRF funds, unless the moneys have been received, a state agency cannot expend moneys based solely on its spending authority.

Agency Explanation: The Attorney General intends to expand its in-house counsel staff in order to reduce agency reliance on outside counsel contract and to expand its knowledge base on hand to meet state agency needs. Preliminarily, the Attorney General intends for the associated costs with the new hires to be paid by the state agencies utilizing their services, but at much lower rates than they are currently paying outside counsel.

Agency Explanation: Several legislative changes have affected spending requirements of the Charitable Law Section over the past several years. Agency Explanation: Revenues are expected to increase over the next biennium as a result of the following: (1) Effective January 2006, the Ohio Peace Officer Training Commission (OPOTC) increased the advanced training fees at the Richfield location from \$35 to \$50 per day. (2) Effective April 2006, the OPOTC increased the advanced training fees at the London location from \$50 to \$65 per day. The reason this increase was effective in April as opposed to January was due to the fact that once the main facility reopened in April, meals were then included in the tuition fee. (3) Effective April 2006, the OPOTC implemented a \$15 per night charge for those officers in need of overnight accommodations. Historically, dorm rooms were available at no charge to any officer attending a London area course. (4) With the opening of the newly renovated academy, enrollment figures have notably increased. A continued increase in the overall enrollment is expected as a direct result of the newly renovated London facility.

To accomplish such an initiative, resources such as additional regional locations, staffing, and equipment would be required. Currently, the office has a limited number of staff receiving public protection complaints in the Columbus location. The Attorney General would like to increase the number of regional locations throughout the state (e.g., Youngstown, Dayton, etc.) as well as enhance current efforts in the Columbus location to provide better access and customer service.

Agency Explanation: Fund R04 serves as the holding account for recoveries made by various legal sections. This requested level reflects a more realistic starting point based on historical activity.

Expense by Program Series Summary

The Office of the Attorney General's budget is categorized into the following three program series: (1) Criminal Justice, (2) Legal Services, and (3) Program Management. A more detailed description of these programs can be found in the section of this document entitled *Analysis of Executive Proposal*. The pie chart immediately below shows the total recommended appropriations (FYs 2008 and 2009) by program series. This information is shown for the GRF and for all funds.



Revenues and Spending

As noted in the table below, the Office of the Attorney General's GRF funding, as measured by spending group, from actual FY 2004 disbursements through recommended FY 2009 appropriations will have increased by \$1.2 million, or 2.1%. During that same six-year period, the GRF portion of the Office of the Attorney General's total budget will have dropped from 35.3% down to 27.9%. The Office of the Attorney General has filled that difference by tapping into other non-GRF funds, most noticeably the revenue-generating capability of its accounts lodged in the State Special Revenue Fund Group.

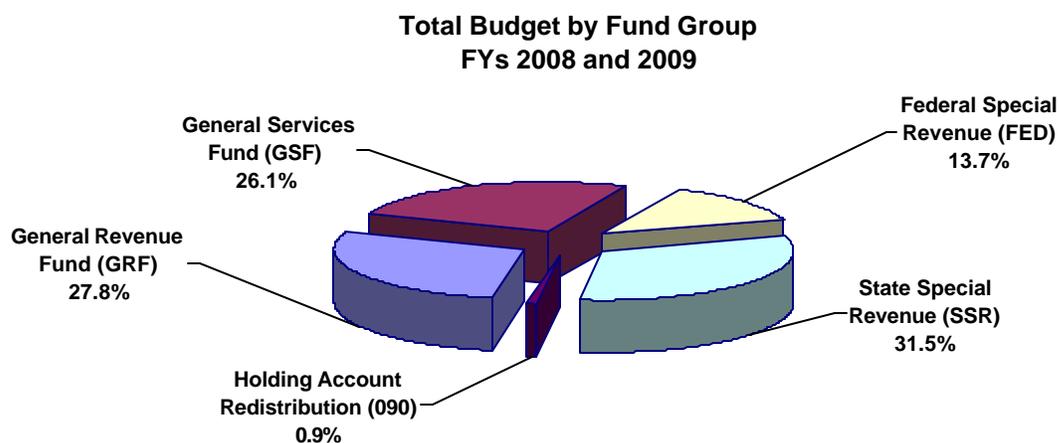
The Office of the Attorney General's total spending will have increased by \$45.6 million, or 29.1%, over the six-year period covering actual FY 2004 disbursements through recommended FY 2009 appropriations.

Object of Expense Summary

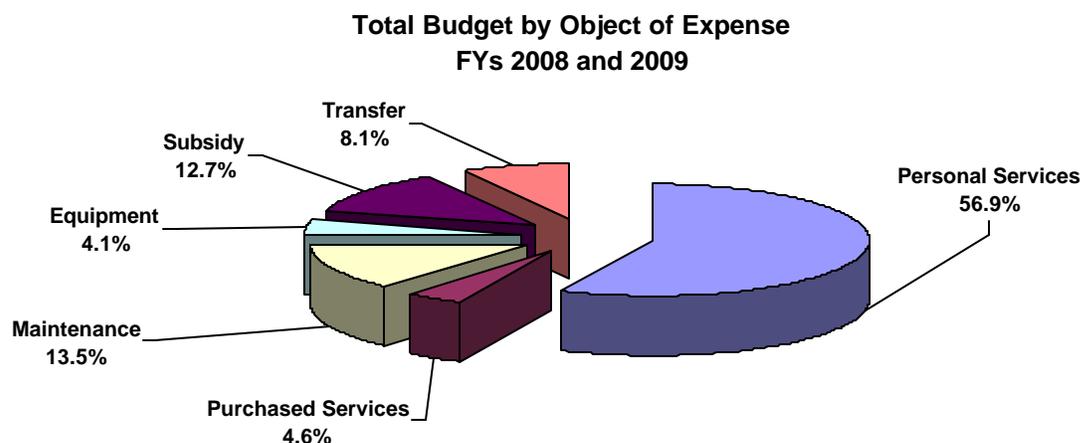
As noted in the table below, over the six-year period covering actual FY 2004 disbursements through recommended FY 2009 appropriations, roughly 75%, or three-quarters, of the Office of the Attorney General's annual spending will have gone to finance operating expenses (personal services, purchased personal services, maintenance, and equipment). This reflects the fact that the performance of the Office of the Attorney General's duties and responsibilities are relatively labor-intensive.

According to the budget request submitted by the prior acting Attorney General, the agency plans to make several equipment purchases in the upcoming biennium. These purchases are meant to replace much of the existing infrastructure of several law enforcement projects. As can be seen by the table below, planned biennial spending in the equipment category will increase by \$6.8 million, or 68.7%, over the previous biennium's expenditure levels.

Program 1.01 – Law Enforcement

Program Description: The Law Enforcement Program encompasses all sections and functions of the Office of the Attorney General charged with providing services to the law enforcement community across the state, as well as those sections providing enforcement-related activities. The program includes the Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation (BCII), the Peace Officer Training Academy (POTA), the Organized Crime Investigations Commission (OCIC), and units for capital crimes and health care fraud. The Drug Abuse Resistance Enforcement (DARE) Program and the legislatively mandated pay supplements for county sheriffs and county prosecutors are included in this program.

Implication of Executive Recommendation: According to the Office of the Attorney General, the executive-recommended funding levels will permit the Attorney General to:

- Support 426 current staff positions assigned to law enforcement activities.
- Focus on activities in the area of reducing turnaround time and reducing backlogs for various crime scene and laboratory operations.
- Develop and expand the Ohio Law Enforcement Gateway, a secure web site designed to provide law enforcement agencies and prosecutors access to a host of databases and to encourage sharing information between jurisdictions.
- Implement and administer an expanded continuing professional training program for Ohio's peace officers.
- Increase the emphasis on programs administered by BCII that assist local law enforcement, ranging from DNA and crime laboratory analysis to Internet juvenile crime prevention, undercover narcotics investigations, and detection of methamphetamine labs.

Temporary Law

Tobacco Settlement Enforcement (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that GRF line item 055-404, Tobacco Settlement Enforcement, shall be used by the Attorney General to pay costs incurred in the oversight, administration, and enforcement of the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement.

County Sheriffs' Pay Supplement (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that GRF line item 055-411, County Sheriffs' Pay Supplement, shall be used for the purpose of supplementing the annual compensation of county sheriffs as required by section 325.06 of the Revised Code. The provision also permits the Attorney General to request that the Director of Budget and Management transfer appropriation authority from line item 055-321, Operating Expenses, to line item 055-411 for that state purpose.

County Prosecutors' Pay Supplement (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that GRF line item 055-415, County Prosecutors' Pay Supplement, shall be used for the purpose of supplementing the annual compensation of certain county prosecutors as required by section 325.111 of the Revised Code. The provision also permits the Attorney General to request that the Director of Budget and Management transfer appropriation authority from appropriation item 055-321, Operating Expenses, to line item 055-415 for that state purpose.

Corrupt Activity Investigation and Prosecution (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget reiterates that the proceeds, fines, and penalties deposited to the credit of the Corrupt Activity Investigation and Prosecution Fund (Fund 629) be disposed of as provided for under current law (section 2923.35 of the Revised Code). The provision also allows for an automatic increase in the fund's appropriation authority, if necessary, without the need of any other further legislative action or Controlling Board approval.

Attorney General Federal Funds (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that line item 055-638, Attorney General Federal Funds, shall be used to receive federal grant funds provided to the Attorney General by other state agencies, including, but not limited to, the departments of Youth Services and Public Safety.

Organized Crime Commission Distributions (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that line item 055-601, Organized Crime Commission Distributions, shall be used by the Organized Crime Investigations Commission, as provided by section 177.011 of the Revised Code, to reimburse political subdivisions for the expenses the political subdivisions incur when their law enforcement officers participate in an organized crime task force. The provision also allows for an automatic increase in the fund's appropriation authority, if necessary, without the need of any other further legislative action or Controlling Board approval.

Program 1.02 – Victims Services

Program Description: This program encompasses all functions of the Office of the Attorney General charged with protecting or assisting victims of crime and with protecting children and the elderly. These functions include the following:

- Crime Victims' Services and the Victims of Crime/Reparations Fund, which awards compensation to eligible victims of violent crime for their unreimbursed economic losses.
- Victims Assistance Program, which provides funding to rape crisis centers and domestic violence shelters.
- Missing Children's Clearinghouse, which coordinates and improves the availability of information on missing children.
- Identity Theft Passport Program, which is aimed at assisting victims of stolen identities.
- Child and Elder Protection, which uses experienced criminal prosecutors and investigators to assist local prosecutors in child support, physical and sexual abuse cases, Internet and computer crime investigations, and elder abuse cases.

Temporary Law

Fund Adjustments (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that, on July 1, 2007, or as soon as practicable thereafter, the Director of Budget and Management shall transfer the cash balance in the Crime Victims Compensation Fund (Fund 108) to the Reparations Fund (Fund 402). As of this writing, Fund 108's cash balance is less than \$1. Upon completion of this transfer, the Crime Victims Compensation Fund (Fund 108) is hereby abolished.

Implication of Executive Recommendation: According to the Office of the Attorney General, the executive-recommended funding levels will permit the Attorney General to:

- Increase enforcement of consumer protection statutes and improve public education on consumer issues through the use of technological advancements as well as enhanced outreach initiatives.
- Expand efforts for the development of a near paperless, web-based database that will allow Ohio's 20,000 charities and nearly 2,000 bingo license applicants the ability to apply, register, and pay required fees electronically.
- Establish a Predatory Lending Task Force, which will aggressively act to protect seniors and other citizens vulnerable to corrupt financial practices.

Temporary Law

General Holding Account (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that line item 055-631, General Holding Account, shall be used to distribute moneys under the terms of relevant court orders received from settlements in a variety of cases involving the Office of the Attorney General. If it is determined that additional amounts are necessary for this purpose, the amounts are appropriated.

Antitrust Settlements (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that line item 055-632, Antitrust Settlements, shall be used to distribute court-ordered antitrust settlements in which the Office of the Attorney General represents the state or a political subdivision under section 109.81 of the Revised Code. The provision also allows for an automatic increase in the fund's appropriation authority, if necessary, without the need of any other further legislative action or Controlling Board approval.

Consumer Frauds (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that line item 055-630, Consumer Frauds, shall be used for distribution of moneys from court-ordered judgments against sellers in actions brought by the Office of the Attorney General under sections 1334.08 and 4549.48 and division (B) of section 1345.07 of the Revised Code, and that these moneys be used to provide restitution to consumers victimized by the fraud that generated the court-ordered judgments. The provision also allows for an automatic increase in the fund's appropriation authority, if necessary, without the need of any other further legislative action or Controlling Board approval.

Program 2.02 – State Agencies

Program Description: This program provides legal representation to state officials and state agencies. This legal representation, which is functionally divided between 16 sections, includes legal advice, contract review, and litigation support. The program is highly personnel intensive, with more than 90% of its costs attributable to salaries and fringe benefits for the attorneys and support staff who provide these services to various state officials, agencies, boards, and commissions.

Temporary Law

Workers' Compensation Section (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget stipulates that Fund 195 receive quarterly payments from the Bureau of Workers' Compensation and the Ohio Industrial Commission to fund the legal services provided by the Office of the Attorney General to those two state agencies. The Bureau of Workers' Compensation payments are supposed to include moneys for support of the Office of the Attorney General's Workers' Compensation Fraud Unit. The provision also requires the Office of the Attorney General, the Bureau of Workers' Compensation, and the Ohio Industrial Commission to mutually agree upon the amount of the quarterly payments.

Attorney General Review of Selection Process for Outside Counsel (Section 703.03). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that, on July 1, 2007, or as soon as practicable thereafter, the Attorney General shall undertake a review of the selection process for outside counsel for the state and shall review all options for recovering cost savings from respective state agencies to which counsel is provided, including options for charging state agencies for a portion of the savings realized. After undertaking such review, the Attorney General may develop, in consultation with the Director of Budget and Management, a cost savings method that accurately accounts for costs savings realized from the outside counsel selection process and may implement the method, subject to the approval of the Director of Budget and Management. If a method is implemented, the Attorney General shall report, not later than the 30th day of June in each of FYs 2008 and 2009, on its method and certify its continued accuracy to the Director of Budget and Management, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the Senate, and the Legislative Service Commission.

Fund Adjustments (Section 227.10). A temporary law provision contained in the executive budget states that, on July 1, 2007, or as soon as practicable thereafter, the cash balance and related expenditure activity of the Employment Services Fund (Fund 107) will be transferred to the General Reimbursement Fund (Fund 106). Upon completion of these transfers, the Employment Services Fund (Fund 107) will be abolished. Under current law, moneys deposited to the credit of Fund 107 are used to support operation of a portion of the Office of the Attorney General's Health and Human Services Section that handles unemployment compensation collection and litigation matters for the Department of Job and Family Services. Under the executive-recommended budget, this revenue stream and related purpose will be transferred to Fund 106.
