Purpose: This line item funds program services to alleviate problem sports gaming in Ohio, under an agreement with the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS). CAC works with outside experts, partners (OhioMHAS, Lottery Commission, the Problem Gambling Network of Ohio), and the industry to collaboratively determine the best programs and resources to implement. Money is not be used for any administrative costs; it solely provides assistance to Ohio citizens.
