

Ohio Special Interest License Plates

Special interest license plates are license plates that are manufactured upon customer request. They contain specified character combinations, logos supporting a special interest group, or both. All special interest license plates (except military) require an additional annual fee of \$10 for initial and renewal transactions. Special interest logo license plates may include a fee of up to \$50 that is earmarked for a particular organization.



At the end of CY 2020, there were a total of 336 active logo license plates, including 166 organizational plates, 114 military plates, and 56 collegiate plates.

Special license plate contribution revenue is generally credited to the License Plate Contribution Fund (Fund 5V10) and distributed quarterly to designated organizations. From FYs 2017-2021, contributions credited to Fund 5V10 averaged \$2.4 million annually.

All license plates in the state of Ohio are manufactured and distributed through a partnership between the Ohio Penal Industries (OPI), a division of the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, and the Ohio Department of Public Safety.



Effective December 29, 2021, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles retired the "Ohio Pride" license plate (left) and began issuing the "Sunrise in Ohio" license plate (right) as the state's new standard issue license plate.
