Report

The Ohio Department of Higher Education (ODHE), in accordance with Senate Bill 1 (130th General Assembly), is submitting the Fiscal Year 2019 OhioMeansJobs Workforce Development Revolving Loan Program (WDRL) Annual Report. ODHE and the Treasurer of State (TOS) jointly administer the program.

In Fiscal Year 2019, the program provided loans to support a student's education or training that can lead to employment in an in-demand field. The loans were at 4% per annum on a seven-year schedule. Students sought out short-term credentials, with commercial driver's license (CDL) programs being the most popular. ODHE made awards to 26 institutions: eight community colleges, three universities, eight Ohio technical centers, and seven for-profit colleges. The programs and loan amounts are listed in the following table.

Loan Disbursements

In Fiscal Year 2019, 49 programs sought assistance through the program, 20 more than the number of programs funded in Fiscal Year 2018. The following charts provide a comparison of Fiscal Year 2017, Fiscal Year 2018, and Fiscal Year 2019 disbursements:

ODHE and TOS enhanced marketing and outreach processes to attract more institutions and business partners to the program. Additionally, ODHE and TOS prepared materials to communicate and emphasize the importance of entrance and exit loan counseling for all students receiving program loans. ODHE and TOS conducted regular on-site visits to grant recipients to review programs and meet with students and business partners. The visits provided insight into program strengths, areas to improve, and identification of best practices. Growing interest in the program demonstrated the expanding and strong partnership between Ohio's institutions of higher education and businesses.
