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## **Executive Summary**

Ohio's various occupational licensing and regulatory boards monitor, license, and regulate selected occupations and professions. Many of the regulated professions provide services in technical and specialized fields such as nursing, medicine, and engineering, where the failure to meet minimum standards could be dangerous or costly. The boards, as defined by section 4743.01 of the Revised Code, are charged to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of the public by ensuring the professionals who practice in these fields meet certain standards.

Section 103.13 of the Revised Code requires the Legislative Service Commission (LSC) to prepare this annual report to evaluate the extent to which boards and commissions are financially self-supporting. This report provides a summary of the licensing and financial activities, and major legislative changes that took place during FY 2005 (July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005), affecting the entities that regulate occupations and professions, as defined in section 4743.01 of the Revised Code. Individual boards provided information for this report.

Most of the occupational licensing and regulatory boards listed in this report deposit funds into the Occupational Licensing and Regulatory Fund (Fund 4K9), established by Am. Sub. H.B. 152 of the 120th General Assembly to serve as a repository for license fees and other assessments. Before that, appropriations for each licensing board were made from the GRF. This created some problems as some boards contributed more revenues than they expended and others had to be subsidized by the GRF since the revenues they generated were not sufficient to cover operating expenses. Pooling revenue in a single fund eliminated these problems. In fact, it is quite common now for the boards to develop a surplus in the fund to cover unforeseen economic hardships. Please note, however, that this report also covers licensing boards that operate through other funds, which, like the 4K9 Fund, are supported by license and other fee revenue.

Am. Sub. H.B. 66, the biennial operating budget bill for the FY 2006-2007 biennium, had the broadest impact on boards by including legislation that prepared the way for a consolidation of 20 of the boards into the departments of Health, Commerce, and Public Safety. Notwithstanding the board consolidation, 14 bills enacted in FY 2005 impacted 18 of the licensing boards in one or more ways.

There was no discernable pattern of change in license activity between FY 2004 and FY 2005 among the boards. Twenty-three boards experienced increases in the number of active licenses in those years and sixteen experienced decreases. However, of these changes, only seven boards experienced increases or decreases in licensing volume of more than 10%. Revenue and expenditure patterns over the period tended to vary with the renewal cycle of licenses issued. Board-by-board figures for FY 2005 reveal no distinct pattern that is applicable to all boards. Although many boards experienced changes in staffing levels in FY 2005, staff increases or decreases were minimal in most cases.

Four boards and commissions licensed a total of over 100,000 of their respective license types in FY 2005. They are the Ohio Board of Nursing (206,950), the Division of Securities in the Department of Commerce (143,660), the Board of Emergency Medical Services (140,646),

and the State Board of Cosmetology (115,834). Note that there is no fee for licenses issued by the Board of Emergency Medical Services. Rather, the Board and the division within the Department of Public Safety that houses it are funded solely from traffic fine revenue in the Seat Belt Fund (Fund 83M).

The Department of Administrative Services' Central Service Agency (CSA) supports the administrative operations for most of the licensing boards. Approximately 25 of the boards included in this report use various services and forms of assistance available to them through CSA, including budget development, budget entry, controlling board support, management consultation, procurement, fiscal processing, human resources, fixed asset management, and payroll. The consolidation of services available to the boards through CSA provides administrative efficiencies for these shared services. The information in this report is divided into three main sections that are described below.

**Section I: General Information** – The first section begins with a description of the functions of each licensing or regulatory board, followed by a brief description of any legislation that became effective in FY 2005 that affects any of the boards. This section also contains a table of general information, such as staffing levels and renewal cycles for each board.

**Section II: Active Licenses** – The second section lists the total number of active licenses for each board for this fiscal year and the previous fiscal year. The change in the total number of licenses from FY 2004 to FY 2005 is also calculated.

**Section III: Revenues and Expenditures** – The third section contains information on the revenues and expenditures for each board for FY 2004 and FY 2005. This information is organized according to renewal cycle for each board (e.g., annual and biennial). Note that the boards that renew licenses biennially receive the bulk of their fee revenues in alternate years. The table contains information on both Fund 4K9 revenues and expenditures and any non-Fund 4K9 revenues and expenditures. The table also shows the changes in both revenue and expenditures from FY 2004 to FY 2005 and the net gain or loss for the two fiscal years combined.

## **General Information: Board Descriptions**

### **Accountancy Board of Ohio**

The Accountancy Board tests, licenses, and regulates individuals and firms who practice public accounting in this state to ensure that the services being provided are performed in accordance with all appropriate ethical and professional standards.

### **Architects, State Board of Examiners of**

The Board of Examiners of Architects adopts, promulgates, and enforces the rules and statutes governing the profession of architecture in the state of Ohio.

### **Athletic Commission, Ohio**

The Ohio Athletic Commission regulates any public or private competition that involves the sports of boxing, kickboxing, karate, tough-man contests or tough-person contests, professional wrestling, or any other form of boxing or martial arts, within the state of Ohio. The Commission licenses athletic agents and promoters of boxing, wrestling, kickboxing, and mixed martial arts.

### **Auctioneers Program (Agriculture)**

The Auctioneers Program in the Division of Enforcement, within the Department of Agriculture, administers Chapter 4707. of the Revised Code, which provides for the licensure of various auctioneers and auction firms.

### **Barber Board, Ohio State**

The Barber Board licenses barbers, barber instructors, barber shops, and barber schools. The Board protects the health and welfare of the consuming public by setting standards for licensure and by enforcing these standards through exams, investigations, and disciplinary actions.

### **Building Standards, Board of (Commerce)**

The Board of Building Standards, within the Department of Commerce, certifies local building departments to enforce the Ohio Building Code. The Board also promulgates the state building code, boiler code, and elevator code. The Board recently established the Ohio Building Code Academy to train building department personnel. A minor function of the Board is to certify building department personnel and fire protection system designers.

### **Chemical Dependency Professionals Board**

The Chemical Dependency Professionals Board is responsible for regulating the licensing and certification of chemical dependency counselors and prevention specialists, issuing and

renewing those licenses and certifications, investigating ethics complaints, and reviewing and approving the content of education and training as it pertains to chemical dependency treatment and prevention professionals.

**Chiropractic Board, Ohio State**

The Ohio State Chiropractic Board protects the health and welfare of Ohio's citizens through licensure, and enforces licensure standards through examination, renewal, clinical inspection, investigation, and disciplinary action.

**Construction Industry Licensing Board, Ohio (Commerce)**

The Ohio Construction Industry Licensing Board, within the Department of Commerce, licenses specialty contractors in five trades (HVAC, Refrigeration, Plumbing, Hydronics, Electrical) who perform commercial work in the state of Ohio. The Board also assures professionalism and customer confidence through examination and continuing education.

**Cosmetology, Ohio State Board of**

The mission of the Ohio State Board of Cosmetology is to establish, maintain, and regulate the sanitary and professional standards set forth by the Ohio Revised Code and the Ohio Administrative Code for the practice of cosmetology in Ohio.

**Counselor, Social Worker, and Marriage and Family Therapist Board**

The mission of the Counselor, Social Worker, and Marriage and Family Therapist Board is to protect the citizens of the state of Ohio through the effective and efficient regulation of the practices of counseling, social work, and marriage and family therapy as identified in Chapter 4757. of the Revised Code. This mission is accomplished by the review of applicants' credentials, the administration of licensure examinations, and the establishment and enforcement of professional and ethical standards of practice.

**Dental Board, Ohio State**

The Ohio State Dental Board licenses and regulates the profession of dentistry, dental hygiene, and dental assistant radiography through enforcement of Ohio's Dental Practice Act, found in Chapter 4715. of the Revised Code. The Board's focus is to protect the health and safety of Ohio's citizens.

**Dietetics, Ohio Board of**

The Board of Dietetics protects the health and safety of Ohio citizens by regulating the practice of dietetics as defined in Chapter 4759. of the Revised Code.

**Embalmers and Funeral Directors, Board of**

The Board of Embalmers and Funeral Directors licenses and regulates embalmers, funeral directors, funeral homes, crematories, and embalming facilities. The Board also resolves complaints against any of those who are regulated.

**Emergency Medical Services, Board of (Public Safety)**

The Board of Emergency Medical Services, within the Department of Public Safety, oversees training and certifies all emergency medical technicians and firefighters. The Board approves all training institutions and instructors and administers its grant fund.

**Financial Institutions, Division of (Commerce)**

The Division of Financial Institutions, within the Department of Commerce, is responsible for the supervision and regulation of Ohio's state-chartered banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations, and savings banks. The Division also regulates trust companies, foreign and domestic money transmitters, mortgage brokers, second mortgage lenders, small loan lenders, pawnbrokers, precious metal dealers, insurance premium finance companies, credit services organizations, check cashers, and check casher lenders.

**Hearing Aid Dealers and Fitters Licensing Board (Health)**

The Hearing Aid Dealers and Fitters Licensing Board, within the Department of Health, regulates the practice of fitting and selling hearing aids pursuant to Chapter 4747. of the Revised Code.

**Homeland Security, Division of (Public Safety)**

The Division of Homeland Security, within the Department of Public Safety, was established as a new division within Public Safety in September 2003 to strengthen Ohio's commitment to addressing the new threats and challenges of terrorism in the wake of the September 11, 2001 attacks. The Homeland Security Division also oversees the licensing and regulation of private investigators and security guards.

**Industrial Compliance, Division of (Commerce)**

The Division of Industrial Compliance, within the Department of Commerce, provides building and construction plans review and inspections of plumbing, electrical and structural systems, elevators, boilers, bedding and upholstered products as well as regulation of individuals in the building trades. The Division provides administrative support for three boards: Board of Building Standards (which develops the Ohio Building Code), Board of Building Appeals (which handles compliance adjudication), and the Construction Industry Licensing Board (which provides testing, certification, licensing, and continuing education services for skilled trades). The Division also provides support to the Ohio Ski Tramway Board and the Historical Boilers Licensing Board.

### **Landscape Architect Examiners, State Board of**

The State Board of Landscape Architect Examiners adopts, promulgates, and enforces the rules and statutes governing the profession of landscape architecture in the state of Ohio.

### **Manufactured Homes Commission, Ohio**

The Ohio Manufactured Homes Commission's mission is to train, examine, and license manufactured home installers; train, license, and certify manufactured home inspectors; certify local building department inspectors; develop standards for installation of manufactured homes; and provide a dispute resolution process for manufactured home complaints.

### **Medical Board of Ohio, State**

The State Medical Board of Ohio protects and enhances the health and safety of the public by regulating the practice of Doctors of Medicine, Doctors of Osteopathic Medicine, Doctors of Podiatric Medicine, Limited Practitioners, Physician Assistants, Anesthesiologist Assistants, and Acupuncturists.

### **Medical Transportation Board, Ohio**

The Ohio Medical Transportation Board ensures appropriate care and safe transportation for the citizens of Ohio by inspecting, certifying, and licensing all private emergency (ambulance), nonemergency (ambulette), and air medical services and associated vehicles as defined in Chapter 4766. of the Revised Code. The Board promulgates rules, investigates inconsistencies, and takes appropriate action to assure compliance with laws governing the medical transportation industry.

### **Motor Vehicle Collision Repair Registration, Ohio Board of**

The Ohio Board of Motor Vehicle Collision Repair registers all independent collision repair facilities, which includes paintless dent repair, mobile airbag repairers, automotive glass repair shops, and mobile automotive repair and replacement technicians.

### **Motor Vehicle Dealer Licensing Board (Public Safety)**

The Motor Vehicle Dealers Licensing Board, within the Department of Public Safety, carries out all of the due process functions necessary to identify violators, charge them with the violations, and to effectuate the suspension and revocation of the licenses of such violators. The office assists in drafting amendments and organizing the public hearings for the adoption of administrative rules, etc.

### **Motor Vehicle Salvage Dealer Licensing Board (Public Safety)**

The Motor Vehicle Salvage Dealers Licensing Board, within the Department of Public Safety, carries out all of the due process functions necessary to identify violators, charge them

with the violations, and to effectuate the suspension and revocation of the licenses of such violators. The office assists in drafting amendments and organizing the public hearings for the adoption of administrative rules, etc.

**Nursing Home Administrators, Board of Examiners of (Health)**

The Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators, within the Department of Health, uses its statutory power to develop, adopt, impose, and enforce regulations prescribing standards, which must be met by individuals to receive and maintain a license as a Nursing Home Administrator.

**Nursing, Ohio Board of**

The Ohio Board of Nursing actively safeguards the health of the public through the effective regulation of nursing care. The Board regulates registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, advanced practice nurses, dialysis technicians, and community health workers.

**Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Athletic Trainers Board**

The Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Athletic Trainers Board regulates the practice of occupational therapy, physical therapy, and athletic training by licensing qualified candidates, investigating complaints, and reviewing the continuing education activities of licensees.

**Optical Dispensers Board, Ohio**

The Ohio Optical Dispensers Board regulates the practice of opticianry and ophthalmology through examinations, licensing, continuing education, and license enforcement.

**Optometry, State Board of**

The State Board of Optometry carries out the responsibilities of Chapter 4725. of the Revised Code through examinations, licensure, license renewal, continuing education, compliance, investigations, and enforcement activities for all Ohio licensed optometrists.

**Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics, State Board of**

The State Board of Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics was created to protect the public by assuring that persons providing services as orthotists, prosthetists, and pedorthists meet appropriate minimum qualifications through education, experience, and training. It is the duty of the board to review applications for licensure, issue and renew licenses, educate licensees and the general public about appropriate practice in these regulated professions; and investigate and, where necessary, take enforcement action to assure compliance with the laws and rules governing the professions within the Board's jurisdiction.

**Pharmacy, Ohio State Board of**

The Ohio Pharmacy Board licenses all persons who distribute dangerous drugs and sites where dangerous drugs are stored in Ohio. The Board also enforces the Pharmacy Practice Act, Dangerous Drug Distribution Act, Food and Drug Act, Controlled Substance Act, and the Criminal Code of Ohio relating to Drugs.

**Professional Engineers and Surveyors, State Board of Registration for**

The State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Surveyors oversees the licensure and renewals of professional engineers and professional surveyors and enforces the provisions of Chapter 4733. of the Revised Code.

**Psychology, State Board of**

The State Board of Psychology licenses psychologists and school psychologists for practice administered outside of school settings. The Board also regulates the practice of psychology and takes enforcement action against unethical or illegal practice. In addition, the Board registers unlicensed service providers who work under the professional supervision of a licensee.

**Real Estate and Professional Licensing, Division of (Commerce)**

The Division of Real Estate and Professional Licensing, within the Department of Commerce, administers the law governing real estate brokers, salespersons, foreign real estate, appraisers, and cemeteries.

**Respiratory Care Board, Ohio**

The mission of the Ohio Respiratory Care Board is to license and regulate the clinical practice of respiratory care pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 4761. of the Revised Code, and to license and register home medical equipment facilities pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 4752. of the Revised Code, which includes licensing qualified applicants, investigating complaints, inspecting home medical equipment facilities, and establishing a continuing education program.

**Sanitarian Registration, State Board of**

The State Board of Sanitarian Registration protects the public health by ensuring that individuals engaging in the practice of environmental health possess and maintain specialized knowledge and skills in the field of environmental health science.

**Securities, Division of (Commerce)**

The mission of the Division of Securities, within the Department of Commerce, is to maintain a balance between investor protection and capital foundation enhancement. To achieve

this mission, the Division regulates the sale of securities and licenses securities professionals who sell securities and give advice about investing in securities in Ohio. The Division also operates an investor education program.

**Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology, State Board of**

The State Board of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology regulates the professions of speech-language pathology and audiology in accordance with the Revised Code.

**Veterinary Medical Licensing Board, Ohio**

The Ohio Veterinary Medical Licensing Board licenses, regulates, and enforces the laws governing the practice of veterinary medicine in the state of Ohio. Specifically, the Board licenses veterinarians, registers veterinary technicians, qualifies candidates for examination, and disciplines veterinarians and veterinary technicians based on consumer complaints.

## **General Information: New Legislation Enacted in FY 2005**

Multiple bills affected numerous boards and commissions during FY 2005. Summaries of legislation affecting the boards and commissions are presented alphabetically by the board name. All the bills discussed below became effective between July 1, 2004 and June 30, 2005, except for Am. Sub. H.B. 66, the FY 2006-2007 main operating budget act. Law changes affecting the boards in that act are also described in this section.

### **Architects, State Board of Examiners of**

Sub. H.B. 322 made changes to sections 4703.02 and 4703.33 of the Revised Code, authorizing both the State Board of Examiners of Architects and the State Board of Landscape Architect Examiners to adopt rules pertaining to the satisfactory completion of continuing education requirements for their licensees. Also, the main operating appropriations act, authorized the State Board of Examiners of Architects to levy fines against violators of the statutes or rules.

### **Auctioneers Program (Agriculture)**

Am. Sub. S.B. 209 revised many aspects of the Auctioneers Law, including licensure requirements, auction examinations, administration and enforcement, and the State Auctioneers Commission, an advisory body.

### **Barber Board, Ohio State**

H.B. 66 required the Ohio State Barber Board to annually review the rules adopted by the State Board of Cosmetology. If the Barber Board determines that the rules adopted by the State Board of Cosmetology, including, but not limited to, rules concerning the use of career technical schools, would be beneficial to the barbering profession, the Barber Board must adopt rules similar to those it determines would be beneficial for barbers.

### **Building Standards, Board of (Commerce)**

Am. Sub. H.B. 175 required the Board of Building Standards to promulgate a mandatory Ohio Residential Building Code for local governments, which desire to enforce a one, two, or three dwelling house code. The Board is required to certify municipal corporations, county, and township building departments to enforce the Ohio Residential Building Code and their personnel.

### **Construction Industry Licensing Board, Ohio (Commerce)**

Sub. S.B. 179 made several changes to the Board. The act changed the Board's name from the Ohio Construction Industry Examining Board to the Ohio Construction Industry Licensing Board. The act allowed the Board to impose sanctions including fines and continuing education requirements on licensees who violate regulations. There is also an additional fee required for all continuing education attendees. The act also allowed the Attorney General to

bring a civil action against nonlicensed individuals acting or claiming to be a contractor licensed by the Board. The act also assigned the review or training agency applications to the administrative section of the Board. Rules to accompany Sub. S.B. 179 became effective April 1, 2005.

### **Financial Institutions, Division of (Commerce)**

Am. Sub. S.B. 209 provided for a transition of pawnbrokers' licenses from annual licensure to biennial licensure. The act adjusted related fees and other provisions to account for the change in renewal cycle and specified how proceeds from biennial license fees are to be distributed.

Sub. H.B. 401 modified the law regulating check-cashing lenders by increasing the authorized amount of a check-cashing loan from \$500 to \$800 and modifying the fee for such a loan if it is \$500 or more. The act also expanded the offense of passing bad checks to apply to electronic transactions.

### **Manufactured Homes Commission, Ohio**

Sub. S.B. 102 created the Ohio Manufactured Homes Commission to regulate the installation of manufactured housing. The act requires the Commission to adopt rules establishing standards that govern the installation of manufactured housing, establishes requirements for issuing a manufactured housing installer license, permits the Commission to discipline manufactured housing installers and to deny licenses to installers for specific reasons, and permits the Commission to certify local departments to accept and approve plans and inspect installations of manufactured housing.

One complication has been that the Commission's activities hinge on changes made at the federal level. In fact, the Ohio Attorney General has informed the Commission that it cannot go forward with rulemaking or other regulatory activities based upon the absence of U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development model standards, on which the Commission's statute depends. The Commission is currently working on re-drafting its statute so that it may begin conducting its activities.

### **Medical Board of Ohio, State**

Two bills increased the Board's disciplinary scope of authority for physicians. Sub. H.B. 215 addressed professional liability reform efforts and established qualifications for expert witnesses who provide testimony. The legislation also clarifies that the State Medical Board's jurisdiction over out-of-state doctors who testify as experts in malpractice trials extends beyond the time of their actual testimony, as the doctor licensed in another state is "deemed to have a temporary license" in this state solely for the purpose of providing testimony.

Sub. H.B. 126 permitted physicians to provide RU-486 medication to induce abortions only in compliance with federal law. The law requires physicians who prescribe RU-486 to report any serious medical events to the State Medical Board. Such reports are considered public

records, although the name and other patient-identifying information are not released. Any violation of this law is considered a fourth-degree felony. The law also mandates that the Board automatically suspend the physician's license for a minimum of one year if the physician is found guilty of a second or subsequent violation of the requirements of the law. However, this legislation was enjoined prior to the effective date and the matter remains pending in the courts.

#### **Motor Vehicle Salvage Dealers Licensing Board (Public Safety)**

Sub. H.B. 230 established that a motor vehicle salvage buyer's identification card expires biennially, rather than annually. The bill also increased the fee from \$10 annually to \$35 biennially. These changes are projected to result in an increase of \$8,900 in annual revenue to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles Fund (Fund 4W4).

#### **Nursing, Ohio Board of**

The main operating appropriations act for FYs 2006-2007 included language creating a pilot program for the certification of medication aides. While the program is to be conducted initially as a pilot, it will become permanent law unless there is a future act by the General Assembly. Once rules are promulgated, certified medication aides will be authorized to administer medications to residents of nursing homes and residential care facilities participating in the pilot program.

#### **Pharmacy, Ohio State Board of**

Sub. H.B. 377 permitted the State Board of Pharmacy to establish and maintain a drug database to monitor the misuse and diversion of controlled substances and other dangerous drugs the Board includes in the database pursuant to its rules. If established, the act requires the drug database to include prescription and drug purchase information that is to be submitted to the Board by designated pharmacies and all wholesale distributors of dangerous drugs licensed in Ohio and to specify the persons and entities that may receive information from the database. The act also requires the Pharmacy Board to submit biennial reports to the House and Senate Health Committees on the cost and effectiveness of the database.

#### **Professional Engineers and Surveyors, State Board of Registration for**

Sub. H.B. 322 increased the fee for a renewal of registration as either a professional surveyor or a professional engineer from \$16 to \$20. The fee increase is expected to result in a revenue gain of \$136,000 per year. The purpose of the act was to establish continuing professional development requirements.

#### **Real Estate and Professional Licensing, Division of (Commerce)**

Am. Sub. H.B. 106 made several changes to the Real Estate Broker Law in Chapter 4735. of the Revised Code. Among other provisions, the act requires the Real Estate Commission to provide training to Commission members and Division of Real Estate and Professional Licensing employees. The act also permitted criminal records checks of applicants or licensees (a fee is

permitted to be charged for the checks). Under the act, all licensees must mail back licenses via certified mail when requested by the Superintendent of Real Estate. The act reduced continuing education requirements for those 70 years of age and older and also set forth requirements regarding agency disclosure forms.

Sub. H.B. 231 required the Director of Commerce to revise the real property disclosure form not later than January 1, 2006 to include a statement that information on the operation and maintenance of the type of sewage treatment system serving the property is available from the Department of Health or the applicable board of health.

**Respiratory Care Board, Ohio**

Sub. H.B. 105 established authority under the Respiratory Care Board to license and register home medical equipment facilities. The Board anticipates this legislation will result in the licensure and registration of over 350 facilities in Ohio.

**Sanitarian Registration, State Board of**

The FY 2006-2007 operating budget act allows the Board to use electronic means of communication in informing registered sanitarians of the list of approved continuing education courses. Prior law had required that at least once annually, the Board would have to mail each registered sanitarian such a list. The budget act also increased licensure fees for various license types found in section 4736.12 of the Revised Code, which are presented in the table below.

**Securities, Division of (Commerce)**

Following concerns about the investment practices of the Bureau of Workers' Compensation, the FY 2006-2007 budget act required the Chief Investment Officer of the Bureau of Workers' Compensation to be licensed by the Division of Securities.

**Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology, State Board of**

The FY 2006-2007 main operating budget act amended the Board's governing statute, Chapter 4753. of the Revised Code, to require a doctoral degree in audiology as a prerequisite for licensure after December 31, 2005. The change only affects those audiologists that are awarded audiology degrees after December 31, 2005.

### **Veterinary Medical Licensing Board, Ohio**

The FY 2006-2007 main appropriations act established a veterinary student loan repayment program and appropriated \$60,000 in FY 2006 for this purpose. The Board is working on the necessary rules to implement the program.

### **Board Consolidation**

The FY 2006-2007 operating budget act included a section that prepared the way for 20 of the occupational licensing and regulatory boards to be consolidated into the departments of Health, Commerce, and Public Safety. Under the plan, the Department of Health would receive the Chemical Dependency Professionals Board; the Board of Chiropractic Examiners; the Counselor, Social Worker, and Marriage and Family Therapist Board; the Ohio Board of Dietetics; the Ohio Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Athletic Trainers Board; the Ohio Optical Dispensers Board; the State Board of Optometry; the State Board of Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics; the State Board of Psychology; the Ohio Respiratory Care Board; the Board of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology; and the State Veterinary Medical Licensing Board.

The Department of Commerce would receive the Ohio Athletic Commission, the Barber Board, the State Board of Cosmetology, the Board of Embalmers and Funeral Directors, the Manufactured Homes Commission, the Board of Motor Vehicle Collision Repair Registration, and the State Board of Sanitarian Registration. Finally, the Department of Public Safety is to receive the Medical Transportation Board.

The plan calls for a transition team consisting of the Director of Budget and Management, representatives of the directors of Administrative Services, Commerce, Health, and Public Safety, and three members representing the affected regulatory boards to develop a plan to effectuate the consolidation of the boards, including addressing the details of the consolidation and developing budgets for the departments and boards. However, the transition team may also recommend additional regulatory boards and commissions to be consolidated as well as modifications to the planned consolidations.

The transition team is to submit a report containing the recommendations and details of the consolidation to the Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the President of the Senate by December 31, 2005. Furthermore, Am. Sub. H.B. 66 specifies that it is the intent of the General Assembly to introduce a bill in FY 2006 that makes the necessary statutory changes and includes revised appropriations for the affected agencies for FY 2007.

# Section III

## Revenues and Expenditures

## Revenues and Expenditures

The tables in this section are organized according to each agency's renewal cycle. The boards included in this report predominantly renew licenses on an annual or biennial basis. The exceptions are the Accountancy Board and the Division of Emergency Medical Services, which renew on a triennial basis. New in the tables this year is a column that lists the amount each board or commission encumbered in FY 2005. An encumbrance is a charge against an agency's appropriation for a particular fiscal year, but is to be disbursed in the next fiscal year. Including encumbered funds provides a more complete picture of an agency's expenditures charged to the fiscal year. Most commonly this applies to end-of-year Central Service Agency charges, personal service contracts, and some equipment purchases.

### Agencies with a Triennial Renewal Cycle

#### Division of Emergency Medical Services

The Division of Emergency Medical Services is the administrative arm of the Emergency Medical Services Board under the Department of Public Safety. The eight license types that the Division of Emergency Medical Services oversees carry no license fees and therefore, generate no revenue. The EMS Division is funded solely from traffic fine revenue in the Seat Belt Fund (Fund 83M). The Division of Emergency Medical Services carries forward no fiscal balance or deficit from fiscal year to fiscal year. The expenses accrued by the Division of Emergency Medical Services for FY 2005 totaled \$2,259,556.

#### Accountancy Board of Ohio

In addition to Fund 4K9, the Accountancy Board of Ohio operates the CPA Education Assistance Fund (Fund 4J8). As with most boards, the Accountancy Board's license revenues and the Board's operational expenditures are collected and disbursed from Fund 4K9. Moneys from Fund 4J8 come from fees paid by licensees and are used for the Board's scholarship program, created through legislation in FY 1993. That legislation increased the basic education requirements an individual must meet to become licensed as a Certified Public Accountant. The Accountancy Board of Ohio has been running surpluses in Fund 4K9 since the inception of the fund. Encumbrances for the Board amounted to \$32,552 in FY 2004 and \$7,747 in FY 2005.

**Agencies with a Biennial Renewal Cycle**

Many of the boards renew their licenses on a biennial cycle. Because of this, each board receives the bulk of its licensing revenue every other year. A board may run a deficit in its "off" year that will be eliminated during its renewal year. The two-year renewal cycle must be analyzed to determine if a board is financially self-sufficient.

**Agencies with an Annual Renewal Cycle**

Most of the other boards in this report renew their licenses on an annual basis. These boards are, therefore, less likely to experience "on" and "off" years in terms of the revenue they receive.
